Boothville, now of Petherton, Wellington Co. sends us some infomation regarding the representation of the County in the very earliest days taken from a history of Wellington now running fn the Guelph Mercury, of which the following is an extract: Before proceeding to give the Mun-

icipal Councils of the County since the organization of the District of Welli gton under the Municipal act of 1842, it may be well to refer briefly to the system that prevailed for the management of local affairs before that period. This may give the reader a slight idea of the inconveriences suffered by the people of this district previous to the introduction of the new sy tem. As already referred to, Wellington at first formed a part of the Gore District, of which the County Town was Hamilton. All such cases as are now disposed of by the Courts of Assize, County Courts and Quarter Sessions were then adjudicated upon at Hamilton. Jurymen had all to go there, and on account of the distance Sheriff's and Bailiff's expenses were high. The business now disposed of by our Municipal Councils was then transacted by the magistrates assembled in Quarter Sessions at Hamilton, and in consequence of the distance and the wretched condition of the roads, the magistrates from this district were not able always to attend, so that the disposal of the business that came before them was not always very satisfactory to these

In the year 1838 an Act of the Parliament of Upper Canada was passed, forming the new District of Wellington. It was composed of the Township of Proton, Luther, Amaranth, and Melancthon, formerly a part of Simcoe County; the Townships of Guelph, Garafraxa, Eramosa, Erin, Nichol, Waterloo, Wilmot, Weolwich, and the Queen's Bush-now the Township of Peel, Maryboro', and Wellesley-from Coming as it did, from Andrew the Gore District Guelph, Galt and Stewart's direction on Thursday morn- Fergus were claimants for the honor of ing 8th inst, we thought of course he being set apart as County Town, but
