Industrial Home News.

Mr Gee, the clever inmate of the County Home, continues to write interesting notes of Refugee life. We select a portion of his last letter to the Advance as an example of life at Castle of Care.

Ed, Black, who has been an inmate of the home from the time of its opening, was, at his own request, discharged on Monday of last week. He thinks he will be able to do for himself now. Your cor. thought he had better go, too; again he thought he had better not.

James Dunlop, the imbecile inmate referred to in last week's items, on Monday morning of last week made an attempt to escape from the home. Instantly used one of his cunning devices to elude detection, for the old fellow hastened from the breakfast table, went out to the barn, around which he made a circuit or two, then he made a similar circuit of the field, with the object, no doubt, of trying to baffle anyone endeavoring to track him through the snow, and finally crept through the fence on to the gravel road, and headed for Flesherston. He had not gone far, however, when he was missed and traced by Mr. Harness. On perceiving Mr. H. in pursuit the old fellow put on all available speed, which was not very great owing to a badly frozen but well polished foot. He was very soon overtaken and came quickly back. The old fellow is now locked in one of the small rooms each night, on the second flat and adjoining one of the large sleeping rooms. His bed is laid on a slightly raised platform, the window is boarded up and the electric lamp is tied up out of his reach. The room is warm and comfortable and the poor old fellow can do no bodily harm to himself or anyone else during the night.

On Sunday last our divine service room was crowded to its utmost capacity. Mr. H. conducted the service and delivered a most impressive discourse from St John 3-16. This discourse was one of the best that Mr. H. has ever delivered in the house and was most attentively listened to by the large congregation. A cornet and violin accompanied the organ in the musical portion of the service. The choir was small but the singing of the congregation was spirited.

We notice that in some houses of refuge it has come to light that in some instances chargeable inmates were possessed with considerable means of support. One inmate was possessed of more than \$300, another \$500 and others of various smaller amounts. One would think it

The New License Bill.

We give below the salient features of the new License bill presented by the Provincial Government. It has some good features, but the provisions regarding local option, will likely kill that movement if carried as it stands.

The various galleries were filled, both with liquor and temperance men, on 20th March, when Hon. Mr Hanna, the Provincial Secretary, brought down his license bill.

A feature is a substantial increase in the fees, and another important aspect is that the Government and municipalities will now share and share alike. Heretofore, the Government has had an advantage in the revenue.

In the case of Toronto, it wanted the whole, instead with others, it will get half.

The measure provides for the issue of licenses to firms and companies, as well as to individuals.

Municipalities adopting local option must provide for its enforcement.

A by-law on local option shall and must be submitted on the petition of 25 per cent. of the ratepayers. To pass, a by-law must have a majority of three-fifths. Once voted on, and lost, it must not be submitted again for two years.

There shall be no special census; the latest complete municipal census is to be used.

The measure, said Mr Hanna, was to enable the Government to carry out its policy of strict enforcement of the liquor laws. It provided against fraud, and it provided against tied houses.

The clause in the old Act permitting hotels to serve liquors to guests in the dining-room is omitted from the new one.

The fee for hotels in Toronto will be \$1,200, and for shops \$1,000. In the towns, such as Durham, \$350.

Bartenders in cities and towns will be licensed, with a nominal fee of \$2 and their licenses will be transferable from town to town.

Doctor's orders for liquor on Sunday must contain full particulars of the case.

Uniformity of regulations throughout the Province is provided for.

When an hotel-keeper is convicted of three offences within three years the license is to be cancelled. Inspectors must report whether the offence is the first, second, or third, and if the proper officials do not cancel the license, anyone can take action.

Witnesses in liquor cases are to be protected by an order of the Magistrate to prevent them from prosecution.
