In the interests of our Fire Brigade,
I wish to make a few remarks in regard to what we should have here and
that is a good fire alarm system. The
one we have here now for to call the Brigade into action, is too slow and out of date and there is no use making any comment about it. But it is what we should have, and in this matter the question of fire protection should be of the deepest interest to all right thinking people. From the smallest village and town to the great metropolitan centres, fires come to all communities, small and large, and generally occur when and where least expected.

I consider it among the most import-ant, and very first duty of the municipal officers of every town to provide for the protection of the lives, the homes, Mr Geo. Manson, St Catharines, was and property of its citizens against fire.

Time tide and fire wait for no man and those who have been rudely awakened from their midnight slumber by the clang of the bell will readily appreciate that. A fierce fire also will not wait upon the fireman's convenience. It therefore becomes necessary to adopt every imaginable plan to get the advantage, an early start is one of the essentials. We have a good fire company of young men here, we have good fire fighting appliances, but there is something we have not got, a proper alarm system, and it appears to me that there is no reason why we should not have an effective one, of quick communication to give notice to the fire Dept. when a

The greatest virtue of a body of fire fighters is rapidity of organized action and oftentimes the greatest effort to heat back the consuming flames are futile because of a late arrival to gain the advantage over a speedy proposition one must be speedy and in the case of fire there must be an effective fire alarm system.
