WATERMARKS ON PAPER.

Significance of Those First Used-Means of Detecting Forgeries.

Watermarks have proved themselves invaluable for sufeguarding against the forgery of banknotes, bills, stamps, etc., though the difficulty experienced by the Bank of England by evolving a mark defying imitation was very great and was accompanied by the execution of forgaries innumerable. Many a will has been set aside owing to false dates in watermarks, for, thanks to watermarks, we are under no uncertainty respecting the date of the existence of the Ireland's celebrated Shakesperian forgeries were, however, perpetrated with skilful recognition of the watermrk dif-Mculty. At first, says the London Globe, he was unacquainted with any watermarks of Elizabethan times, so he carefully selected markless sheets for his commencing efforts. It sometimes appears on a shield, and in the seventeenth century is surmourded by a ducal coronet, which form 2 is still met with on our ordinary note paper.

The watermark of "demy" paper has ever been the fleur-de-lys, the peculiar cognismos of the House of Burgandy, who were patrons of the Bordeaux industry. In course of time the manufacture of time of time the manufacture of paper became centred in the Low Countries, and the ex-cellence of the Dusch paper, its purity and

durability have never been excelled. The papers manufactured in the Dutch mills have a great variety of watermarks, and many of them are the badges of the noble families who had founded mills eksewhere. Thus the P. and Y. sometimes separate and cometimes conjoined, are the initials of Philip the Good, Duke of Burgandy, 1413 to 1467, and Yeanella, his wife. The ox's head was another ancient water-mark on which Caxton and Faust printed

HOT TAR TO SAVE ROADS. Process Adopted in France to Neutralize

Effect of Automobiles.

France is already endowed with good roads, whereas in the United States the automobile has come as an instrument to awaken interest in the subject of highway building, it is regarded by the French road engineer as a destructive agent of roads already good. Moving with great velocity and with closely adhering and sometimes metal-shod tires,

To combat theese destructive influences many of the French engineers employ the tarring process, which aids powerfully to prevent the disintegration caused by traffic and which, unless arrested, makes the dust nuisance acute.

It has settled down to a possitive conviction in France that hot tar applications are valuable in proportion to the excellence of the surfaces upon which they are laid. When well done the tarring gives the effect of an asphalt pavement, and the foothhold on a macadamixed surface is, of course, much better than on asphalt. In a previous report mention was made of a city boulevard in Marseilles first macadamized and then tarred.
