Egremont Council

Council met April 14, as a Court of Revision on Drain No 3 and to consider Report on Drains No 1 and 2. The Members subscribed to required declarations and Court was opened. Clerk notified that no appeals had been filed. John Belmont paid \$120.00; Geo Harris \$25.00; W. Wood—\$5, being full amount of their assessments on said drain.

McArthur—Ferguson—That Drainage By-Law No 3 be now read 3rd time, signed, sealed etc. Carried.

Robb—Philp—That Court of Revision now close. Carried.

Philp—Ferguson—That this council is satisfied that the requirements of the act respecting notices to said parties to consider Engineer's Report re Drains 1 and 2 have been fully complied with.—Carried.

Report on Drain No. 1 East and Proton was read and an opportunity given for any party to withdraw his name—all were satisfied.

Robb—McArthur—That Engineers report on Drain 1 be adopted and a by-law be introduced to give it effect. Carried.

Robb—Philp—That By-law — to issue debentures for drain No 1 be now read a first and second time. Carried.

Report on Drain No 2 was read etc, as above and no names withdrawn.

Robb—Ferguson—That report on drain No 2 be adopted and a by-law be introduced to give it effect. Carried.

Ferguson—Robb—That by law — to issue debentures for drain No 2 be now read a 1st and 2nd time. Carried.

Ferguson—McArthur—That the following acc'ts be paid and charged to drain No 3; Engineer's acc't for survey \$126; J A Lambert, printing by law \$10; Clerk serving notices on parties interested \$5; do postage 76 cts.

The Reeve as instructed had interviewed Tp Solicitor in Holstein Police Village and reported as follows:

1. That an additional survey be made designating and numbering the village lots now called parts of farm lots and also marking boundaries of said village.

2. That an amended by-law to more clearly designate the boundaries of said police village be passed by the County council.

3. That the Police Trustees make application to the council to submit a by-law for the purpose, be introduced and given two readings with an order for publication, fixing date and place of polling, said polling to be conducted by the council. If vote is favorable the debenture may be disposed of on the by-law, or after the County Council has passed the amended by law as necessity requires.

McArthur—Robb—That the Reeve's report be adopted and he be paid \$3 for his services and the Tp Solicitor's acc't for above of \$2 be paid. Carried.

Robb—Philp—That we now adjourn to May 19th, as a Court of Revision on Drains No's 1 & 2 at 1.30 p.m. and the by law for said drains shall be published by service by the clerk as provided by section 22 of the Municipal Drainage Act and council shall meet at 10 o'clock a.m. for general business. In the Legislature.

The government are entitled to credit for the activity they are displaying in introducing far reaching measures for the public good. It is a notable evidence of the value of a substantial majority. During the last years of the Liberal administration the narrow majority forced the party in power to be continually on the look out for their life, and they had little heart to inaugurate big schemes for the public good.

Amongst the far reaching measures is the new mining law introduced by the Hon Frank Cochrane which bids fair to be of great value by its provision for safe guarding actual miners and making actual discoverers necessary to obtain title. Prospecting permits will be issued but with conditions attached that will prevent speculation. Mining partnerships are regulated, sanitary regulations provided for, and miners and laborers can enforce collection of wages in the same way as mechanics under the Lien Act.

In this connection the government are getting credit for their determination to work the Gillies limit, a rich territory of a hundred square miles, for the benefit of the province at large.

The new bill relating to education makes some radical changes most of which are undoubtedly for the public good. The new Normal Schools are expected to be ready in the fall of 1907, when it is supposed, the Model Schools will be dropped. Provision is made for betterment of the salaries of teachers by introducing the principle of a minimum salary, placed, in the meantime, at \$50 for single-teacher rural schools. This is a radical change and from the teacher's standpoint, wholly deserved, but weak sections will have to be considered and this will be done by some system of government aid.

Some change is greatly needed to give better recognition to continuation class work, such as is done in Durham. This is a class of work in almost all respects the same as that done in High Schools, but the financial aid given is vastly disproportionate. It is to be hoped the government in their zeal will give due attention to this matter.

From the standpoint of the temperance standpoint of the country, the new Liquor Bill is not a success, and the liquor men are not pleased either. Temperance men see that prohibition is not thought of, but that License, strictly enforced, is the ideal aimed at and it should not be forgotten that Mr. Whitney was under no promises or pledges to go further. Temperance people without doubt helped to give him his great majority, not so much to help him as to punish Ross, and they will have to make the best of it now.
