The other, or B type of stroke, as it is called, occurs when an uncharged cloud intervenes between the earth and the charged cloud. This intervening cloud acts with the charged cloud as an electrical condenser, and when a discharge takes place between them, the charge upon the upper surface is neutralized, and that on the lower surface suddenly set free, and consequently throws a sudden strain in the dielectric between the cloud and the earth, with the result that if a discharge takes place, it is apt to follow the erratic path. Canal-Boat Churches.

Both in England and France, says Sunday Magazine, canal boats have proved of great service in the spreading of the Gospel. In England the canal boat travels along the Fens, and reaches scattered districts on the banks of the Broads which otherwise would be lacking a religious service. Services are held on the boat itself. In France, where it is possible to travel thousands of miles by canal, the McCall Mission has done good work. A boat-chapel, which seats 150 people, moves slowly on its way, stopping at hamlet after hamlet for a fortnight or more. Usually the boat is crowded and an overflow congregation listens from the banks. Sometimes the boat is moored under a bridge, and then, too, holds its crowds of listeners, for the services are very popular. On the Delaware River is a wooden church built on the decks of two large boats, and it co be towed from point to point, as for
