LIFE SENTENCE.

GUNNER BARRY FOUND GUILTY OF MANSLAUGHTER.

Quebec despatch: The trial of Gunner John Barry, a former member of the Royal Canadian Garrison Artillery, who is charged with the murder of a comrade named Gunner Richard Kidd Hall, at the Citadel in November last, concluded tonight at 7 o'clock, when the jury returned a verdict of guilty of manslaughter and the presiding judge sentenced him to the penitentiary for the rest of his natural life. The jury took it into consideration that the prisoner was insane when he committed the act and is still suffering from dementia, which influenced their verdict.

The Minister of Justice may have the condemned man examined, and, if found insane, incarcerated in the Kingston Penitentiary lunatic asylum.




