Cheap Electric Power

For Ontario Municipalities.

On Monday last in the Local house most important legislation was introduced by Hon. Mr Beck providing for government aid in securing and furnishing electric power to the municipalities from the vast sources of Niagara or from any source within the Province. This far reaching measure is of vast importance and may result in making Ontario almost independent of the American coal fields.

We hope Mr Whitney's government will succeed in making this new departure eminently successful and no grit will grudge them the honor of passing this important legislation even though the new bill is modelled on one introduced in 1903.

We append from the Globe the chief features of the Power Bill.

The Hydro-electric Power Commission of Ontario is to fix rates of light, heat, power and of gas companies in any part of the Province.

This provision to apply to existing as well as future companies.

The Government may authorize the commission to expropriate power plants and transmission lines, and to develop and transmit electrical energy to municipalities, distributing companies and railway companies.

Municipalities obtaining such energy from the commission to pay back to the commission on a specified plan the cost of the necessary works, the money for which is to be raised by the Government and expended by the commission.

In the discussion following the introduction of the bill the Premier stated that he had every reason to hope and believe that the drastic powers (in relation to expropriation or Government development and transmission) would not have to be exercised by the Government. This bears out The Globe's statement of yesterday that the existing power companies are prepared to accept the control of rates by the commission.

The British budget shows a surplus of \$17,333,000, and Mr Asquith purposes to spend \$5,000,000 in reducing the debt now standing at \$3,944,950,000. If this is kept up every year, the debt will be wiped out in less than 800 years!

The government has made the announcement that a bill is to be brought down placing telegraph, telephone and express companies under control of the railway commission. This means thorough control of rates and connections and is wholly in the interest of the public.

What seems like a backward step has been taken in the railway committee of the house by reducing from 10 years to 5 years the maximum penalty to railway men found guilty of intoxication. Its scope was broadened however to include all classes of railway men who have in any way the care of the movement of trains.

Our worthy M. P.'s have the privileges of the railways free. They have a grievance however: they have discovered they are being put in the upper berths of the Pullman's much too often for an average, and some of them charge plainly that this is done purposely, the authorities keeping the choice berths for those who pay! This must stop. We won't have it.

TOPICS OF THE WEEK

Chief Justice Taschereau of the Supreme Court has resigned after 35 years service. Mr Fitzpatrick, Minister of Justice at present, will likely succeed him, his place in turn being taken probably by Mr Aylesworth.

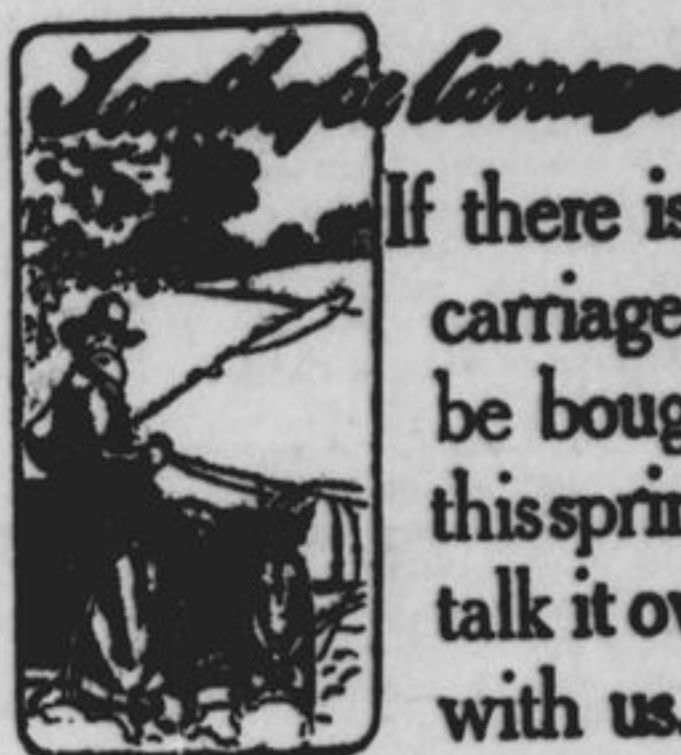
