## TORE UP TRACK.

STRIKING ITALIANS GROW UGLY AT ATTICA, OHIO.

Tiffin, Ohio, May 21 .- Two hundred striking Italian railroad laborers tore up a portion of the Baltimore & Ohio Railway track at Attica last night, The men struck yesterday for higher wages, but their demands were refused.
