As the royal pair passed he hurled the bomb, but missed his mark. Had the missle fallen a foot further nothing could have prevented the transformation of the famous wedding of modern days into a dreadful tragedy. As it was, the bomb exploded, killing a number of spectators and wounding others.

At the moment of telegraphing the exeitement is so intense that it is impossible to obtain accurate particulars, but t it is credibly stated that 16 were killed and 25 injured.
