Farmers' Institute.

At the Annual Meeting held last week in town. The following officers were elected: Pres., Robt. Morice; Vice Pres., Dan Edge; Treas., Geo. Binnie.

Auditors—C. Ramage, A. Davidson. In the absence of Pres. Wm. Young, Mr R. Morice took the chair, minutes were read and adopted as was the Auditors' Report.

Few seemed inclined for the walk and talk to the McGill farm, so the meeting was held in the Hall. Mr James' topic was "weeds." Amurals propagated themselves by the winds. While some were poisonous the chief objections to them was their robbing the moisture from other useful plants. Weeds like the perennial sow thistle required summer fallowing, frequent cultivation required for couch grass cultivate after harvest and leave in ridges during winter, sowing to root crops.

Mr Foster wanted good and clean seed, advocated sowing grass seed in front of drill gaining a surer seed bed. In growing clover especially great vigilance was required to keep out weeds. It was safer to select your own best seed in place of exchanging. Nine times out of ten it will grow better. Would encourage the bees. A Mr Fraser put little bunches of wool all round the field to get them there.

He advocated in connection with the Macdonald Seed Growers' Association the formation of clubs of say four farmers—each one to grow and select from one acre of any grain, each to have a quarter of the proceeds.

Only about 30 were in attendance, but they were much interested in the proceedings.

The S. G. Women's Institute held a series of very successful meetings throughout the latter part of May. Mrs J. W. Butes, of Ind, and Miss L. Shuttelworth, of Guelph, addressed each meeting and very willingly gave information on all topics for discussion. A large number of ladies were present at each meeting and evening meetings held at Holstein and Dro-more were well attended by both ladies and gentlemen. The annual meeting was held in Town Hall, Durham, on June 9th. During the past year thirty meetings with an attendance of five hundred were held in South Grey. The following officers were elected for 1906: President—Mrs W. Mc Crie; Sec. Treas.—Mrs T. McGirr; Directors—Mrs R. Morice, Mrs T. McComb, Mrs D. Hamilton, Mrs R. Pettigrew, Mrs C. Miss Parker, Owen Sound was re-elected Denary Secretary, and all felt that that much of interest had been gained. The Rural Dean of Grey, the Rev. Mr Ardill of Owen Sound was present and also our own good pastor, Rev. Mr Bice, both with helpful words of encouragement.

There was a special service in the evening with an address on the words, "My Presence shall go with thee and I will give thee rest" from the Rural Dean, most inspiring and full of comfort. The possibility of the servants of God finding "rest" in "work" because of "God's Presence" being with them, was very strongly emphasized. The "Annual" will be held (D.V.) next year in Owen Sound.

The sugar beet growing district surrounding Durham, comprising nineteen shipping points for beets, contains 172 farmers who are growing sugar beets totalling 280 acres, being one-eighth part of the whole crop grown for the Berlin Sugar Factory. It is to be hoped the sugar beet fields of this district will receive thorough cleaning and cultivation so they may compare favorably when inspected in June by Dr Shuttelworth, with beet fields of other districts and bring highly profitable returns to our farmers.
