Following the disclosures of disgustang carelessness and criminality in meat packing in Chicage, which have stirred up Congress, come revelations of the means some of the packers take to get the unwholesome goods palmed off upon the public. New York is taking up the matter, and the liealth Department is being urged to act. Commissioner Darlington was quoted as saying that there was no harm in using coloring matter in the meats. Mr. Sinclair, who is pressing for reform, says Darlington should get hold of some of the packers' literature and study it.

"Here is a price list of the Illinois Canning Company," said Mr. Smelair. "It contains a preparation called 'Bleachureland,' advertised to harden. That is, of course, paraffin, an absolutely indigestible substance. The catalogue also contains a list of preservatives and embaiming fluids, dyes for both fresh meats

"Here is a big volume, the catalogue of the S. Birkenwald Company, of Milwankee, which contains the same sort of stuff. Observe particularly 'Wagoner's disinfectant.' This is declared to be indispensible to every butcher.

"Then here is a catalogue of the II. A. Born Company, of Chicago, entitled 'Secrets on the curing of meats.' Ob serve, for instance ,the 'chicken loaf. This is made up of pork shanks, pork trimmings, water and adulterants.

"Here is chopped pork sausage, called 'half and hait,' made of sixty pounds of beef meat, forty pounds of pork fat,

and three pounds of meat preserver. "Here is headcheese, made of sixty pounds of rind (that is, the skins of hogs), twenty pounds of hog shanks, ears, trimmings, etc., half a dozen of enlyes' or pigs' tongues, one pound of Born's headcheese seasoning and three fourths of a pound of 'A' preserver. "You turn over and see what 'A

preserver is. The recipe is not given, but you are instructed to sprinkle the meat thoroughly with 'A' preserver. Next you make a solution and immerse poultry and game for about one hour, which will then keep fresh and bright for a considerable length of time. 'B' preserver is to be chopped up

The Twist of a Bullet. It is impressive to know that the gyratory motion imparted to a rifle bullet by the twist in the barrel may give it a peripheriar velocity sufficient to test its cohesive strength. According to the Iron Age, with the United States 0.30 calibre rifle the rifling gives one revolution of the bullet about its axis in 10 inches. At the service muzzle velocity of the bullet, 2300 feet per second this means 2760 turns per second, assuming that the bullet does not strip in the rifling. The circumference of the bullet is 0,942 inch, which gives a periond, or 13,000 feet per minute.


