CONKEY-CAMPBELL.—Indianapolis papers to hand record the marriage of Dr Jno. A. Conkey to Miss Genevieve Campbell of that city. The ceremony and the occasion seems to have been brilliant belying the respect held for both bride and groom. The former's many friends here extend felicitations.

The Bell Telephone Co., has had a large gang of men here for a week or two making changes and improvements in the wiring of the town. Quite a number of poles have been moved or replaced and cable-strengtheners added here and there. When completed the improvements will no doubt be appreciated by the citizens.

Many patrons of the registered letter system have an idea that the registration of a letter carries with a Government guarantee for its safe delivery, of reimbursement in case of loss. That this is a fallacy is shown by a statement of an official of the department. If a registered letter is lost or burned, or otherwise destroyed, the sender is not entitled to collect anything from the department. The registration of a letter is just an extra safeguard to insure its delivery. In addition, however amounts sent up to \$25 may be insured with the department, the cost being 3 cents up to \$10 and 6 cents up to \$25.

WATERWORKS—Chesley is investigating the question of waterworks and considering the feasibility of bringing it from a lake 10 miles distant. Their Industrial Association, a body akin to our Merchants' Association is urging the council to obtain all possible data as to cost of installation and equipment, and take a plebiscite of the property owners and if the vote be against municipal ownership, then the Association recommends a franchise on the usual terms. Here is a field which Durham might well cultivate with good results. We have lakes and springs within 5 or 6 miles that would meet requirements of fire protection and domestic service; we have a town Association which is active in the town's best interests, and to them as well as to the council, citizens will look expectantly, for proposals along this line.

Royal Canadian Dragoons.

The Sons of Scotland Demonstration Committee at Durham, have succeeded in securing for their Annual Celebration on Dominion Day, a first class attraction in having a detachment of the Royal Canadian Dragoons present. This unique feature will be thoroughly enjoyed and turned to profitable use as well for it will give farmers and horsemen a good idea of the class of horse required by the Military.

In addition to this they offer of course the usual large prizes for Scottish events so keenly contested. Pipe Bands, Dancing, etc., and the Paloro Bros in pantomime and fire acts, ending with a Grand Rink concert at which Harold Jarvis, of Detroit, and other stars will be present.

Dragoons at Windsor.

On 24th May last the Royal Canadian Dragoons, who are to be in Durham on 2nd of July next, were in Windsor and we extract from the Windsor Record of 29 May, the following: "The city was invaded by 15000 visitors, a large portion being Americans. Detroit's Canadian population helped to swell the crowd and joined as heartily as any others in the celebration. The Highlanders made a very pleasing appearance and received a hearty reception. The presence of cavalry, represented by the detachment of the Royal Canadian Dragoons, found much favor with the Spectators. The Dragoons were mounted on lively and fine appearing chargers and gave an exhibition of rough riding on their fiery steeds. Probably the most exciting event on the whole program was a 'military melee' by eight mounted Dragoons. These and other evolutions will be presented on 2nd July. The Highlanders are coming too, so that with the Paloro, the windmill, the games, the races, band music, all records will be smashed.
