

Instant Death.

Ottawa, June 25.-Dr. Lee De Forest, while experimenting to-day at the wireless telegraph station, met with a narrow escape from death. While the operator was sending

message to Montreal, Dr. DeForest started to open the muffler or soun proof box in which are enclosed enormous sparks used at the Ottawa station. In so doing he grasped the iron handle on the door, and the full voltage of the large transformer leaped from one of the lead ires to th handle and through the doctor's body to the cement floor.

As the transmitter is of 20 kilowatt power practically the whole output of 20,000 volts passed through Dr. DeForest's body, enough to produce instant death in nine times out of ten. DeForest was knocked unconscious. but quickly revived, and aside from a partial paralysis of the limbs, which shortly passed away, has felt no ser-

He is unable to explain why the shock was not fatal as both current and voltage were more than deadly.
