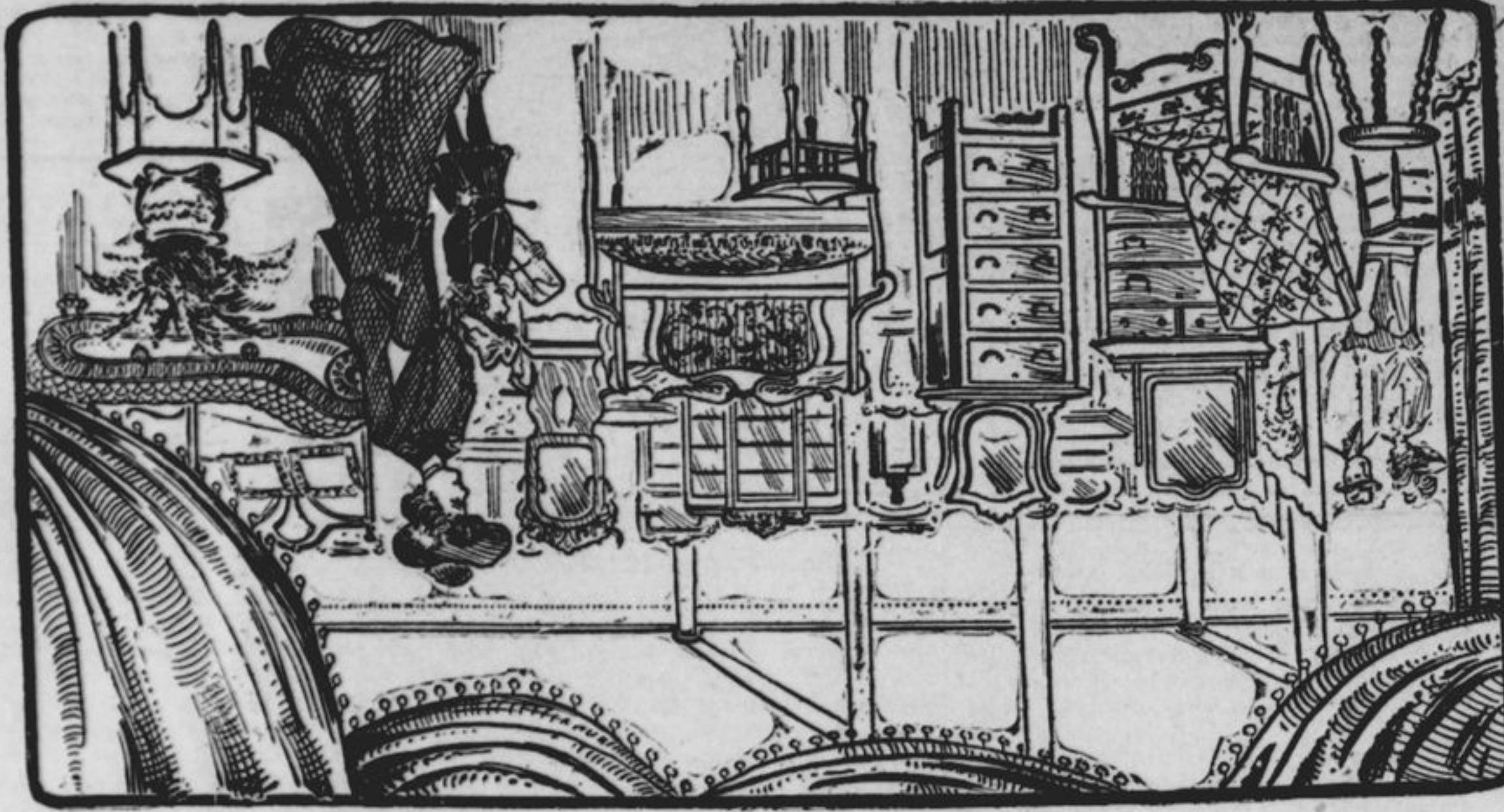

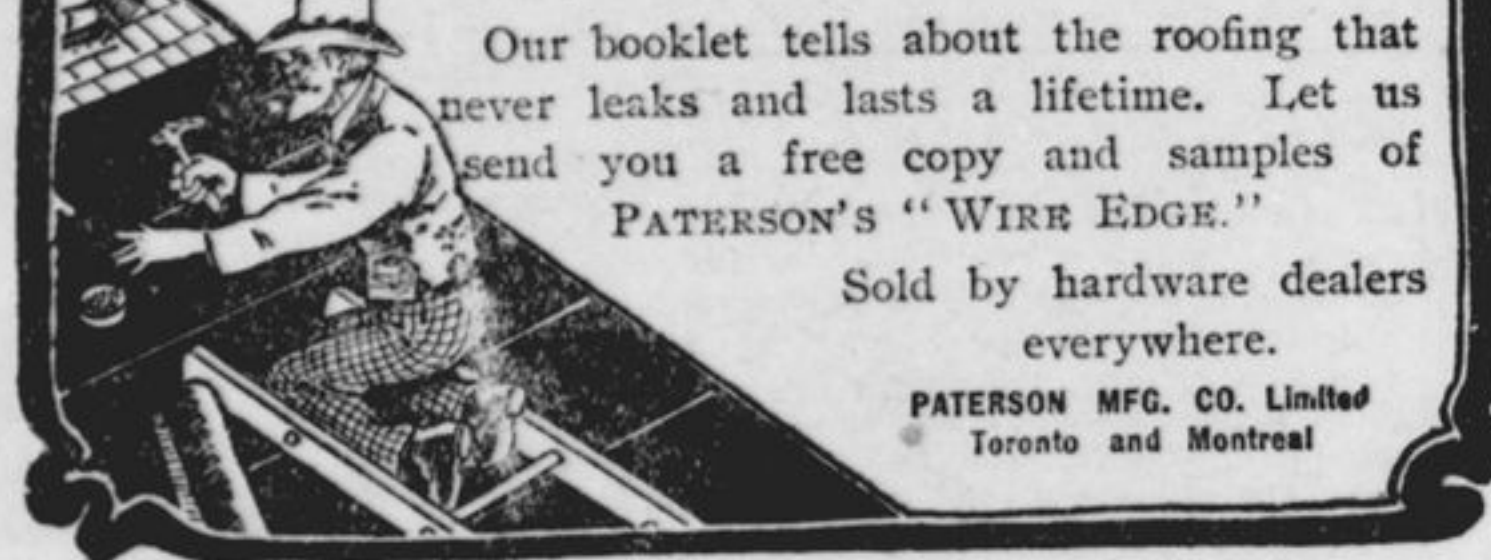

### From Niagara Camp.

Capt G. F. McFarland, Flesherton Co. No. 6, acting adjt. of the 31st Regt, has kindly donated a cup to the Co. winning the most honors in an athletic competition held on Tuesday night. The Regts were inspected this a. m. by Maj-Gen. Lake who made enquiries of those who were wearing ribbons as to their service in South Africa.

A clever capture was made here on Monday morning roll call by the Sergt of Police Shute of the 31st regt. of the Hfl. of the 23rd Parry Sound Regt. bat of Owen Sound a year ago, who was wanted there for stealing a bicycle. Recognizing his man, Shute immediately put himself in communication with the Chief at Owen Sound who put himself in touch with the chief of Police here in civilian clothes and sent to Owen Sound to meet the fate of the transgressor.

Privates J. McKenzie and T. Harrison of Dromore No 4 Co. went to the Butts to day with No 7 Company with the following result:

The cooks of No 4 company, Ptes. Charlie Saunders and Joe Vickers are meeting with a great deal of praise for their excellent cooking, and not only that, but for their impartiality towards the boys of No 7 Co whom they also cook for. After dinner to day the men of No 7 were assembled by their captain, H. V. Rorke in the mess tent and presented an address to chief cook Charlie Saunders and his assistant Joe Vickers accompanied with a handsome pipe and case and tobacco pouch to the former, and a fine brass lined pocket knife of Bokers manufacture to the latter. The address read by the captain was backed up by some finely worded remarks expressing his satisfaction with the agreeable conditions prevailing between men and cooks. Charlie and Joe replied very appropriately though taken by surprise and modestly disclaimed any such flattering terms.

Each were signed on behalf of Committee, Robt Best, Bert White. St. Sgt. Ramage who happened to be near of the time, in the regrettable absence of Capt Snider, expressed the pleasure it afforded him of seeing honor conferred upon the Durham boys and had already expressed himself that next to having a good captain as they had in Capt. Rorke, the next important thing was a good cook for a satisfied Co. and gave the old woman's advice in pleasing a man to "feed the brute."

Time is passing gaily along and the boys realizing that the yards told of long marches before breakfast, of bad water, scorching hot weather, carrying 40 lbs in your knapsack, bread for dinner like cork, stinking meat and rotten potatoes, is all part of the life of a soldier. It is human nature included in the great majority of instances, to deter the new recruit from joining? And also the tendency to sneer at the boys who go and hold them in scorn. As long as the Government or the powers that be look upon it as the "first line of defence" they might at least be credited with a spirit of patriotism. Knowing as they do that in the event of trouble they would be the first called upon, a spirit of patriotism that is more tangible than that of some individuals or class of individuals lay claim to, with such fulsome acclam. The manner of training may not be in accord with those parties' superior judgment; but it is a means to an end however deficient in their eyes.

Having seen Sgt. Maj. Widgory of the Royal Canadian Dragons in regard to the music required on the 2nd of July. He states that either pipe or brass band will do. They will require three brasses each 16 ft long, 2 ft 9 in high, stiff, supported by a foot of brush, with wings on either side 12 ft long made in the same manner to be made movable. They will place themselves the proper distance on arriving. They promise to do their best, and to put up a good thing and hope for a good time generally.

The boys were kept on tenter hooks all the evening of Wed the 20th inst. Orders came out whether genuine or not unable to say, that they had to march out at 9 p. m. Later it was changed to 2 in the morning and received with a great deal of annoyance if not perturbation at the prospect of facing the enemy in the dark. The condition of the weather saved the serious situation however, the Generals no doubt thinking indeed to try an attack in weather that might wet their armor, if not their ammunition. As it was the bugle call came Thursday morning at the cock crowing hour of 4 o'clock, when the whole camp was soon astir and mustered after breakfast and marched off to meet and defeat the enemy with brave hearts and full haversacks at 6. Other regiments had gone the night before taking a supply of blankets with them and would on the road meet with that splashing shower of rain which fell when the others, who were to do the teaching on the morrow at Queenston Heights, were enjoying their supper. How the others fared during the night without their tent cover we leave to the reader's imagination.

Our No 4 brigade which includes our 31st Regt were eventually marched off with their band playing to help cheer the hearts of the boys and to keep that part of their anatomy in its proper place, when a mounted officer galloped up with great gesticulation—some what different from the quiet time beats of Charlie Miller, Band Master—in front of the band and ordered them to the tad place, without the necessary return transport ticket, they were marched about 100 yds and halted and lay down on the grass on the camp ground, for a rest or awaiting orders we don't know which for upwards of an hour.
