### Addenda to Notes from Niagara

Wednesday night was full of uncertainty, rumors were afloat that the regiment was to march off at 2 in the morning. Probably they would have done so only the threatening appearance of the weather decided the officials to wait till 5 in the morning. Our Regt. was up betimes and got in readiness and finally got off at about 7 o'clock. How the others fared who started off at 9 the night before in the wet with the blankets but no tents we do not know; certainly our boys had it bad enough in marching what is variously estimated as 25 to 31 miles; probably 20 anyway, in manoeuvres that can be of no practical use in the future, only to give them a taste now, of what actual warfare would be. They were very highly complimented on coming in by the Brigade and Regimental staff, most impressive spectacles and was admirably commented upon as a fitting finale to a grand day's outing. Thousands of Spectators covered the grounds who came in double democrat, hand-some carriages, and costly automobiles in addition to those who came by excursion train and boat. The hundreds were over at five, marched home, had supper and to the staid for home at eight, but finally ten before leaving arriving at Niagara Falls at 11 p.m.; Hamilton after a quick run at twelve, where we lay and bivouacked as best we could, arriving home as already know at 2 p.m. if not footsore and lame yet weary. A most successful and enjoyable outing in camp, with commanding officers who have been more courteous, considerate and friendly than those of recent years at least.

### Honor to Joseph Townsend.

The following notice from "Saturday Night" refers to the well known founder of the Review in this town. We rejoice that his talents, taste and perseverance have been recognized at last. Few men with such limited means have done more for science:

"Somewhere out in the country back of a big beyond Peterboro there may be to day a farmer and his family surprised by the peculiar behavior of a little elderly man who may be seen in solitude, hour after hour, in the bed of some stream hammering among the rocks. His strange conduct will lead the farmer to believe him insane; and friendly and genial as he will prove to be on approach the explanation he will give of the work he is doing will probably serve to confirm the farmer's worst fears. He will explain that he is hunting fossils, and he will explain that fossils are little stone wiggles of one kind and another embedded in the rocky formation he is examining. The man will be Mr Joseph Townsend, formerly editor of the Grey Review, in Durham, and with newspaper experience covering Dundalk, Orangeville, Elora and Guelph. Perhaps no man has done more than Joseph Townsend to search out and classify the geological specimens procurable in Ontario. He has made it the hobby of his life and with little reward has sacrificed all his interests to the work. The collections at Ottawa and Toronto have been largely made up by him, and the remuneration he has received has been small, although he was glad enough to work and collect for the love of the task. For the first time in his life Mr Townsend has got an opportunity to throw himself into his task and revel in it. The Provincial University has commissioned him to pursue his investigations for four months this summer, half the time in the country from Peterboro to Ottawa and the other half in the country west of Winnipeg. This assignment fulfils the dream of his simple and devoted life. He will rise at dawn, walk incredible distances and pursue his search for fossils until night drives him to seek a bed somewhere—anywhere. There are men with these passions still among us."

### C. P. R. Connection

**A Sure Thing**

In a recent interview with a prominent C. P. R. official we learned with a great deal of satisfaction that the long expected C. P. R. invasion of Hanover is about to become an accomplished fact. It appears that the contract for grading the road from Proton Station or near that point, on the C. P. R. to Walkerton has been let. Work will be commenced very soon at both ends of this section—viz, at Walkerton and work eastward through Hanover and Durham, and at Proton westward.

At a meeting of the Managers of the C. P. R. held this month an appropriation was made to build this branch, and as stated the contract has already been let. From the Walkerton end the road will be extended through Formosa to Teeswater. A branch will be constructed from either Hanover or Durham to Chesley and thence direct to Southampton. Hanoverians would much prefer that this branch run direct to Chesley from Hanover, which would give a direct line to Southampton. The business men of the town should get together and petition the C. P. R. to build the Chesley and Southampton line from Hanover which is no disadvantage to Durham and would greatly benefit us. Our town is growing rapidly and the advent of the C. P. R. will add to the importance of Hanover as a manufacturing centre. —Post.
