The Thaw Family Comes to Murderer's aid

People Say White Paid the Wages of Sin.

Before Marriage.

New York, July 2 .- That Harry] Thaw wes perfectly sane when he murdered Stanford White on Monday times, according to reliable statements night and that no amount of evidence can be produced at his trial concerning his past life and escapades sufficient to make a jury believe him insane was the conviction formed to-day by those engaged in the prosecution of the case. This conviction was the result of what happened this morning at what was the opening round of the legal battle, when Thaw was taken over to the Criminal Court's building to be examined by the District Attorney's ex-

When Thaw faced the experts he sat down easily in a chair and announced in a determined way that he was not going to answer any of their questions put to him on the subject of his mental condition. He could not be induced to change his mind, although his counsel tried to make it appear that Thaw had his consent to submit to the examination. But Thaw did not close his mouth. He asked some remarkable questions of the doctors himself, made comments creditable to a man of normal intelligence, and talked in an easy and natural way.
