A Trip to Montreal.

We have received a nice letter from one of the School Staff, who has just made a trip to Montreal. We leave our readers to guess who it is as she wishes her name withheld if we use the letter publicly.

At 1.30 a. m. we neared Kingston In about 12 hours we had crossed th lake twice and were at the head of th mighty St Lawrence river. We passed through the famed "Thousand Islands" from 6.30 to 8 a. in and consequently had a good view of the interesting scenery. Everywhere one built fine residences on them and have laid out pretty gardens and walks. It would be hard to describe any one of them, as one has to see them to appreciate them. We made three stops at different islands at Clayton, Frontenac and Alexandria Bay. As we near Brockville the islands become fewer and the channel widens. Here again, we make another stop. It is a very pretty town. About twelve miles further East we call at Prescott, where we change from the Lake to the River Steamers.
