ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta; excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age to the extent of one quarter section of 160 acres more Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated. The phomesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:
