What was left after the storm on Saturday is still here. We had the most terrific electrical storm on Saturday that ever was seen in these parts.

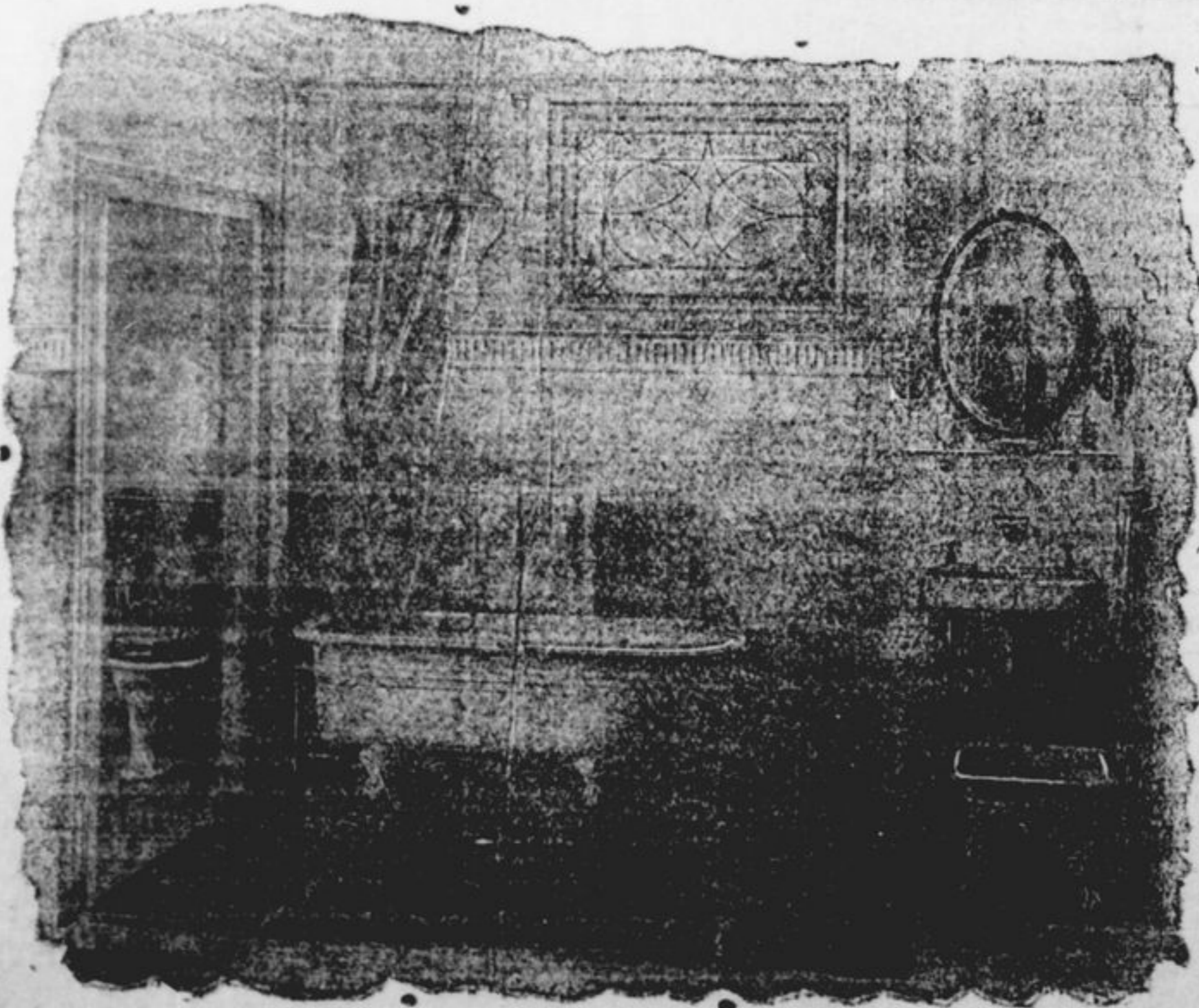
