

Dealers say that least 20,000 baskets will be preserved by the canning factories, while one factory in this city has orders out for 10,000 baskets, all of which have cans. There have been days this season when the boats alone carried away 1.000 baskets of this fruit. To show how really productive the trees have been this year one need not proceed out side the limits of the Garden City.
