#### Just You Watch!

On the ocean at present, or about starting are three Indian chiefs from British Columbia who are going, in a representative capacity, "to see the King." They have made a kind of beginning of this business by seeing Sir Wilfrid Laurier before starting, and have managed to get the interview mentioned in the British press as well.

#### The Price of Peace.

It cost the French Government \$50,000,000 for extra military and naval preparations for fear of war with Germany over the Moroccan difficulty. If those preparations had much to do with averting war, it was not too much to pay, that is, supposing there was no better or cheaper method available. But that is the question all the nations are asking, is not the present method of maintaining international peace a most extravagant one? And there seems to be a quite general consensus of opinion that it is, and better than that, a surer and a cheaper and a well more righteous way is slowly being evolved. The great Interparliamentary Union meets in London the 22nd of the month. That conference will be asked to favor the proposition of transforming the second Hague Conference into a permanent body, to meet automatically and periodically, and to reorganize the Interparliamentary Union so that it can co-operate with the Permanent International Congress at the Hague in shaping a suitable system of international law and duly administering the same. There is little doubt that this proposition will be favorably received by these parliamentary leaders, and every likelihood that it will be accepted by the individual nations, and that this "parliament of nations" will be actually formed. Under it we may be assured that at least the great majority of international difficulties will be settled peacefully, and under it also armament reduction will take place naturally and as a matter of course. It does look as if there were better times ahead for this old world after all.—Christian Guardian.

#### The New School Law.

Important changes, affecting both the Education Department and the public school system, were made during the recent session of the Legislature. To some of these changes the Minister desires to direct the special attention of school officials and municipal councils.

Where the assessed value of all the taxable property of the public school supporters in any township of an organized county is at least equal to an average assessment of \$30,000 for each public school section therein, the municipal council of such township shall levy and collect by assessments upon the taxable property of the public school supporters of the whole township in the manner provided by this Act and the Municipal and Assessment Acts, the sum of \$300 at least for every public school where a teacher or principal teacher is engaged for a whole year exclusive of vacations, and a proportionate amount of such sum of \$300 at least, where an assistant teacher is engaged for six months or longer; and the additional sum of at least \$200 for an assistant teacher engaged for a whole year exclusive of vacations, and a proportionate amount of such sum of \$200 at least, where an assistant teacher is engaged for six months or longer.

Where such assessed value is less than an average assessment of \$30,000 for each public school section in any township shall levy and collect as aforesaid the sum of \$150 at least for every public school where a teacher or principal teacher is engaged for a whole year exclusive of vacations, and a proportionate amount of said sum of \$150 at least where a teacher or principal teacher is engaged for six months or longer; and an additional sum of at least \$100 for every assistant teacher engaged for a whole year exclusive of vacations, and a proportionate amount of such sum of \$100 at least, where an assistant teacher is engaged for six months or longer.

In addition to the sum provided by the township council towards each teacher's salary, the trustees of every rural school section shall, in the cases hereinafter mentioned, pay annually, after the expiration of the current calendar year, to the teacher, where there is only one, and to more teachers where there is more than one, hereinafter mentioned (subject only to a proportionate reduction in case the whole year's salary does not become due) that is to say:

\$200 where the assessed value of the taxable property of the public school supporters in the section is at least \$200,000.

\$150 where such assessed value is at least \$150,000, but less than \$200,000.

\$100 where such assessed value is at least \$100,000, but less than \$150,000.

\$50 where such assessed value is at least \$50,000, but less than \$100,000.

\$25 where such assessed value is at least \$25,000, but less than \$50,000.

And \$100 to every assistant teacher, whatever such assessed value is.

The School for the Blind at Brantford.

To the Editor of The Durham Review. Dear Sir:— I ask your assistance to enable me to get into communication with the parents or guardians of all the blind children in Ontario, under the age of twenty-one years.

The Institution for the Education and Instruction of the Blind, maintained by the Ontario Legislature admits as pupils "all blind youths, of both sexes, between the ages of seven and twenty-one, not being deficient in intellect, and free from disease or physical infirmity, being residents of the Province of Ontario." It is not necessary that the applicant shall be totally blind; the test is inability to read ordinary type and attend a school for the seeing without serious injury to the sight.

The initial difficulty is to locate the children who are eligible for admission, and it will be helpful in the future if your readers will send me the names and addresses of blind children under seven, as well as of those between seven and twenty-one.

Should you favor me by the publication of this letter, I would ask your readers not to depend upon the parents of the children with defective sight to attend to this matter. If all could witness the gain in health, happiness, knowledge and self-reliance that comes to those who, deprived by their affliction of access to the public schools, take advantage of the educational facilities afforded by this institution, none would grudge the time and trouble required to widen the scope of the school's influence. Send me the names and addresses, and I will by correspondence or visitation do the rest.
