After an animated debate, an amendment appealing to the nation to support the Douma against the Government was rejected. Then M. He said the Ministry was endangering the country, which it was incapable of governing. He added that German troops were ready to eccupy Russian territory, in co-operation with Austria, and that the country ought to know what ignominy the Government was preparing for the nation.
