The first autimation given of the crime was when Mrs. Gentry fell down a stairway teading from her apartments, striking the doorway of a physician who lived on the Mrs. Gentry lying against it with her throat cut from ear to ear. dressed for the street. Her death occurred within a few minutes and without her being able to utter a single sound. Constantine was a boarder in the Gentry apartments, and a razor marked "C." was found on the floor just outside the doorway. It has been the theory of the police that he approached her from behind and cut her throat lefore she was aware of his intention, He was seen by several persons to run from the building. A. Gentry, the husband, of Mrs. Gentry, who is a prosperous business man, offered large rewards tor the arrest of Constantine.
