side of the leaf, and thereby produce a skeletonized appearance, but finally devour all parts of the leaves. The young caterpillars drop down, suspended by silken threads by the slightest jarring of the tree and are blown to considerable distances by the wind. They are great travellers, crawling down the trunk of the tree and across wide spaces to ascend another tree. When full grown they go into larval state, forming light grayish cocoons of silk mixed with their own hair. This state lasts about four

weeks. As the hair of this caterpillar are town, but fortunately the crops are bebarbed, their contact with the human skin produces quite an irritation. The very active male has wings and the
