## We are Getting Noticed.

More and more Canada is coming into the lime light of world notice. We have not only touring groups by trainloads of American journalists and other bodies, who freely confess after their trip that Canada was beyond their expectations but from the older lands, Britain especially, we have delegations bodies of all kinds spying out for themselves the wonders of the Canada that has only lately been discovered. For a week or two a band of enthusiastic British bowlers ("mainly Scotch") have been winning victories in our cities and winning praises in the papers, and next week Toronto is going to entertain the British Medical Association. We extract the following from the Christian Guardian:

For the second time within a decade that great organization, the British Medical Association, is to meet in Canada. The former meeting was in the city of Montreal, the coming one is to be in the city of Toronto. On Tuesday, August 21, the opening meeting of this notable gathering will be held. It is expected the attendance will be unusually large, as already over two hundred members of the profession in the British Isles have signified their intention of being present, and it is expected that attendance from our own land will be large and representative. Of necessity the greater part of the programme of the gathering will concern the medical profession exclusively. There will be many items, however, of interest to the general public. The association will be convened under thirteen sections, which will meet daily from 9:30 until 1 o'clock. The discussions and papers of these meetings will, of course, be altogether from the professional point of view. The afternoons and evenings will be devoted to general meetings, public addresses, entertainments, etc. Most of the buildings of the university will be utilized in connection with the meetings. The museum, devoted to medical and surgical appliances, etc., will be one of the most interesting features of the association. Dr. R. A. Reeve, the celebrated specialist of this city, is president-elect of the association.

## C. P. R. Seeks Lake Connections

Toronto Globe—Construction work on the new C.P.R. line which is to link Guelph and Goderich is proceeding rapidly. Steel is now laid for four or five miles west of Linwood and grading is done considerably beyond the end of steel. At Linwood, which has been selected as a junction point, a fine new station, specially large enough to accommodate heavy traffic, has been erected, and the laying of steel on a branch line to Listowel has also been commenced at Linwood and is to be pushed forward with rapidity. It is expected that, in three or four weeks, train service will be inaugurated between Linwood and Guelph, serving intervening points. By early in the autumn, the company intends, it is understood, to have the Listowel branch completed and by the fall of snow to have steel laid through to Goderich. On the direct line between Guelph and Goderich new eighty-lb. steel rails are being laid. On the Listowel connection sixty-lb. steel is used.

The construction of these two lines and of a third from Flesherton via Durham, Hanover and Walkerton to Kincardine is an evidence of the aggressive policy which the company is pursuing to obtain direct routes with low grades from two upper lake ports to Toronto, and also to secure business offering at flourishing towns along these lines.

The significance of the new line, so far as the company is concerned, is that they will connect several towns both inland and along the coast which now are not served by any road. Such places as Goderich, Kincardine, Listowel, Milverton, Elimsa, Blith, Durban, Hanover, Walkerton, Linwood, and the other towns entered by the connection, all give evidence of traffic both passenger and freight, which will greatly increase the company's earnings. Western Ontario, it is true, is well intersected with Great Lakes lines, but the C.P.R. is without any line reaching the lake coast from Owen Sound to Detroit. It is evident therefore, that this company is quietly invading a rich agricultural and promising industrial territory, which the G.T.R. has held for itself for many years, with the intent not only of establishing a good through route to Toronto and Goderich, but of developing a steady local business. In continuation of this scheme, it is proposed to build south from Tecumseh to connect with the new Guelph-Goderich line and east from Flesherton to connect with the new Toronto-Sudbury road now well advanced.
