

The chief aim of teaching Nature Study in the Public Schools is to train the child's power of observation and in this way to develop his character.

The child should be led to make observations. This can be done by asking questions which he canuot answer without carefully obserying the natural objects. > But the child can not always study the time he can not go abroad the can and will will gly help to make this museum a centre of interest. They will readily provide a collection of birds' nests; robin, orio'e, English sparrow. kingbird, swift, phoebe, and chinping sparrow. These not only serve to show the different materials of which birds build nests but they also show the different kings of workmanship and give a clue to the character of the bird itself. In their efforts to get these nests the children will learn where to look for the nests of the various birds, and from the places in which they find them they will learn something of the characters of the birds. In some cases they may be able to determine where the birds' food is procured. These nests, of course, will not be taken until the autumn, when the birds have no further use for them

> If birds' eggs are taken for the museum the children must be cautioned not to take them from the nests unless the birds have left them. On the whole I think it is better not to have the children attempt to get the eggs.

be able to obtain specimens of birds' land and sea shells may be found useful both in Geography and in Nature Study, and the bones might be made to illustrate the Physiology Lesson.

In the Vegetable Kingdom plants various kinds may be collected throughout the summer. The children should be taught how to collect specimens so white cedar can be easily obtained in ship many places. Then they can get Acorns Chestnuts. Horsechestnuts, Beechnuts, Walnuts, Butternuts and Hazelnuts and the keys or Samaras of the various Map-les, and the Ash, Elm and Basswood. To these might be added the fruits of the Wild Rose, Sweet Briar, Burning Bush, Climbing Bittersweet and Bar-berry, all of which can be dried without losing their color or shape. The pods of Milkweed and the feathery sprays of the Wild Clematis will help to give the children an idea of seed dispersal.

To these specimens of the animal and vegetable Kingdoms the children will be able to add the different kinds of rocks to be found in the neighborhood, as well as fossils and specimens of ore.
