A lady who understands advertising says: "No lady wishes to be looked upon as a shopping fiend; she does not care to go into a store in order to find out whether he keeps what she wishes to purchase and whether the article is sold at a price she can afford. It is much easier and pleasanter to look through the advertisements in a paper than it is to bore the clerks and waste her own time. Next to the local news items, the advertisements in a paper stating the articles for sale, will keep much of the money that goes to the cities at home.

If a person orders his paper discontinued he must pay all arrears, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and then collect the whole amount, whether the paper is taken or not. However, we do not comply with the request, for the courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers or periodicals from the post office or removing and leaving them unclaimed while for subscription remains unpaid, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud. If a person wants their paper stopped the way to do so is to pay up.—Ex.

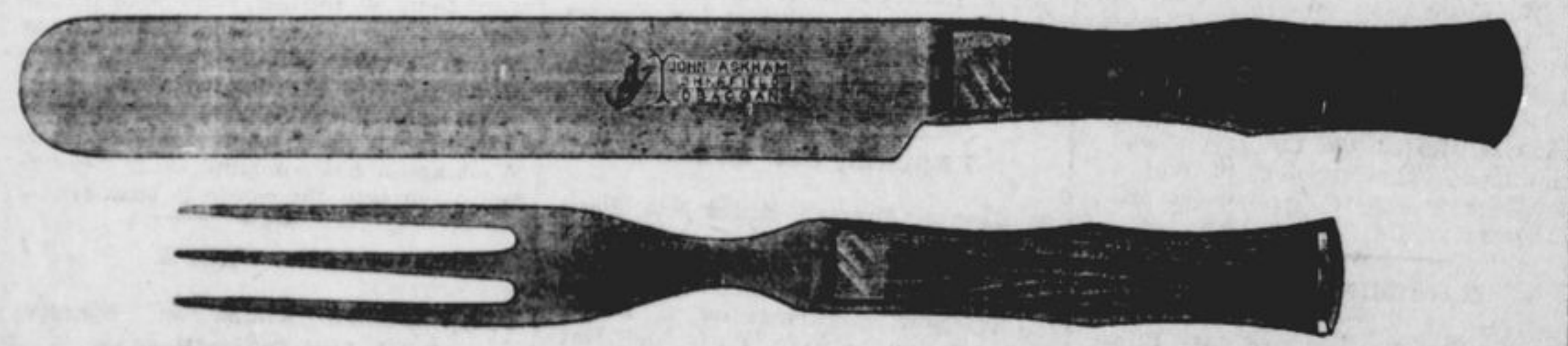
