Egremont Agricultural Society's show on Tuesday was favored with the best of weather, a cloudless sky and genial temperature all day. Nearly 100 exhibitors and probably well over 1000 entries, bore out the record of past years of the township's loyalty to its own show, and though Neustadt's show was on the same day the crowd, judging by the sale of tickets, was as large as ever.

The officers are J. A. Swanson, President; J. G. Adams, 1st Vice Pres.; A. McCaw, 2nd Vice Pres.; W. J. Sharp, Secy. Treas. and they deserve congratulations for the success achieved. There was no untoward incident to mar the day and the croakers who predicted that the show would be a failure owing to local opinion prevailing, must have been dismayed disappointed. The village has just been treated to new sidewalks, an excellent building has been erected on the grounds to accommodate sheep and swine, and a general air of prosperity makes Holstein an attractive little place.

The Farmers' Supply Co. set off the grounds with six fine cutters and a buggy, 3 pulpers, a wagon and 6 wheelbarrows, 3 pumps and a steed arranged while in the hall were two elegant parlor suites, Chapman and LeWartes. ### Railway Notes.

Railway progress is making rapid strides in this fine weather. Priceville correspondent mentions the extent of it in his neighborhood. A steam shovel is to be set a-going we believe near Bunnessan and it is reported another between here and Allan Park. Some dump cars came to this station a few days ago and a supply of rails for them to run on. The Telescope says grading is completed from the 30th sideroad in Brant to Hanover so that it is evident "ail along the line" activity is being displayed.

The Telescope laments the loss of some fine scenery but closes with a bit of worldly-wise philosophy as follows: "This paragraph will meet the eye of many a Walkerton old boy, who, perhaps has not seen the town for years, but who will remember the beautiful stretch of scenery on the east side of the river, from a few rods above the dam, all the way up to the South Line. Elsel's wooded flats, together with the heights far north, and which continued right on to the dam, richly clothed with balsam, poplar and other varieties of trees, provided the best bit of scenery the town could boast of. About midway on this stretch, was the spring at the rock, near where several generations of Walkerton boys have learned to swim. Well, if one of these old boys were to come back now, he wouldn't know the place at all, for the railroad men have cut down and burnt up the trees on the side of the hill, leaving it bare and bleak. We would much rather the railway had taken some other route, but we would sooner have our scenery spoiled than to do without the road.
