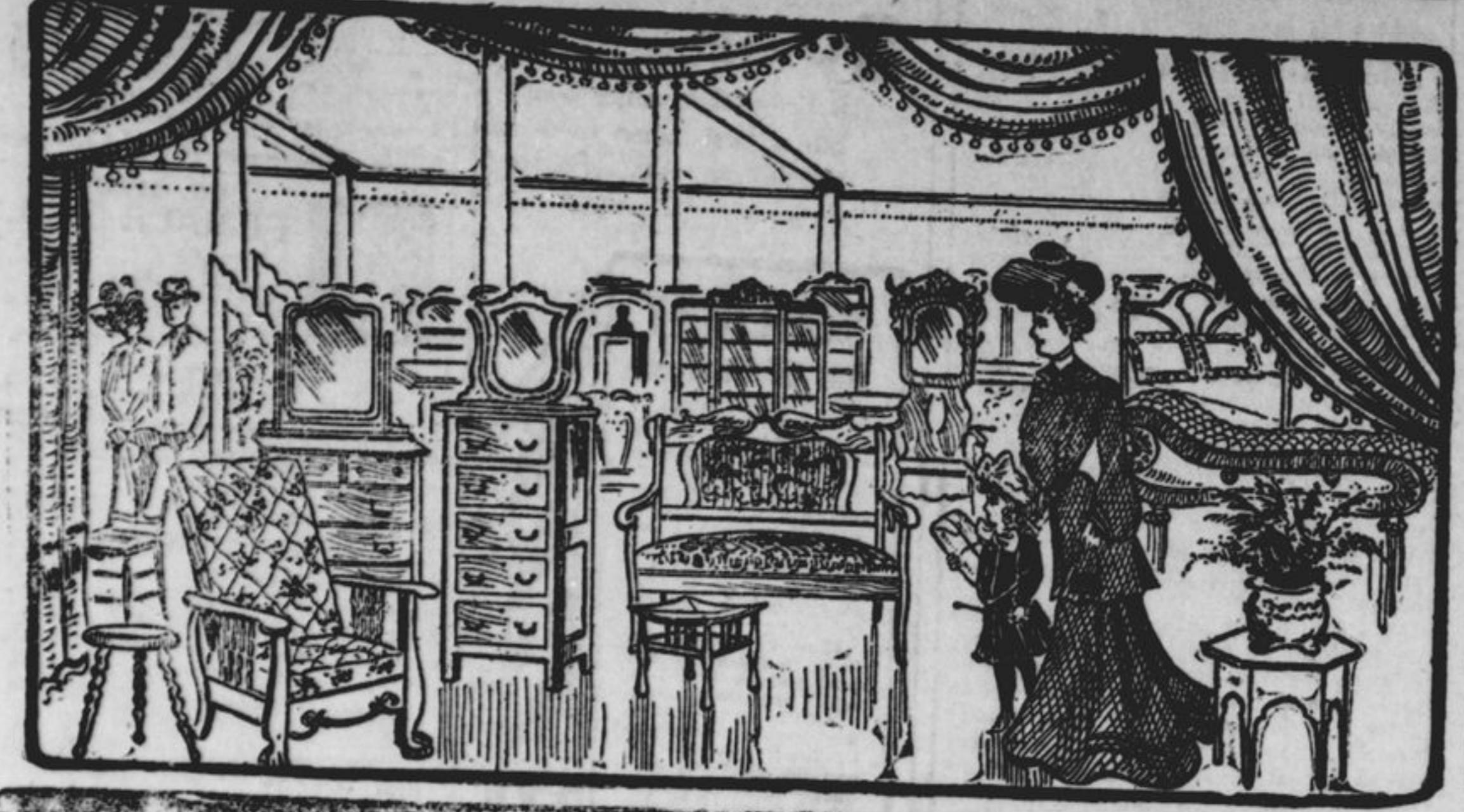

A Prophecy.

The Hanover Post in lamenting the lack of enthusiasm towards the Bentinck show, which was so marked as to almost spell failure enters the realm of prophecy as follows:

We are safe in saying that twenty years from now, even ten years from now, perhaps in five years or less the relative merits and size of Walkerton, Durham, Chesley, Southampton and Hanover will not be so nearly similar as they are to-day. Will we be content to allow these towns to beat us out in the race for position and success; more can we afford to let Hanover be dilatory in this matter of progress? Can we?

Perhaps the most outstanding cause for regret is that there is a general lack of interest, or at least the lack of manifestation of interest in institutions of a public character calculated to cherish and improve civic prosperity. This past week we had an instance of it. Everyone or nearly everyone, had a desire in a dim sort of a way to see the annual show of the Bentinck Agricultural Society carried through successfully, but etc.

Now a similar appeal is not unneeded in Durham. We are at the parting of the ways caused by the advent of a third should lead mayor, man and merchant to size up the situation and take hold of the opportunity of the times to make progress. If we but mark time in the presence of outside activity, we are bound to fall behind while others march on. The council and the Merchants' Association should lay their heads together to make the advantages of Durham still better known and the motto of every citizen should be "Watch Durham Grow" but he should not be a watcher alone.

—The East Elgin election resulted in the return of the Conservative candidate, Marshall, by a majority of 89. This swing of the pendulum was no doubt caused by two things—the disgusting exposure of bribery in the election at London, and the change of Liberal candidates in the middle of the campaign. We are by no means lamenting the exposures, nor whining about the time they were brought on. Every election should be so conducted that at any time investigation should be welcomed. It is humiliating to find every now and then such a record of debauchery and no punishment short of imprisonment should be meted out to those who buy men's souls for cash and to those who sell them.
