Local Option Campaign in Forty Municipalities in Ontario.

In over 40 municipalities the campaign for local option has opened in Ontario, and many others are expected Tecumseh, West Tilbury, Tottenham, Tosorontio, Usborne, Westminster. Woodbridge and Walsingham.

The conditions under which local op-tion by-laws may be submitted and car-CENTRAL ried this year differ somewhat from last. Formerly it was optional with the municipal council whether or not a local prohibition law should be submitted, a council to disregard a petition for the submission of a law when presented. Now a council is compelled to submit a law when it is petitioned for by 25 per cent of the electors. Formerly a bare majority vote was sufficient to carry the law, now a three-fifths majority is required.
