TEACHERS VOTE.—The new advisory council authorized by the latest Education Act is to consist of 20 members, four of whom are to be elected by the Public School teachers. Mr Samuel Acheson, of Ottawa, well-known in Egrement and South Grey is a candidate and his 25 years' experience in all grades of schools should make him eminently qualified to represent the profession. South Grey teachers would make no mistake in giving him a vote.
MARRIED.—At high noon on Wednesday 17 October in Trinity church, Durham, by Rev Mr Bice, Rector, Mr Mackenzie Anderson of Newcastle N. B. was married to Miss Ellen Wilson late of Sault Ste Marie. Both were former residents of Walkerton Ont, and were highly respected young people. The bridal party drove from the residence of Mr Wm Laidlaw the bride's uncle, who gave her away and joyous bells rang out on their return. The bride was married in a traveling suit of navy blue broadcloth and carried her prayer book bound in white satin. After congratulations and an elegant repast they left for a trip to Toronto and other Ontario points before proceeding to their home in Newcastle.

COURT BRUCE OBJECTS.—The Chesley Enterprise prints a resolution passed by Court Bruce, I. O. F., of Chesley, which declares that "the management of the affairs of this order by some of its Supreme officers has not been marked by careful avoidance of objectionable tactics and entanglements. Especially does this court question the wisdom of having retained the services of Dr Montague after the Australian episode. This court also regrets that certain officers in their entangling transactions with trust and land companies evidently forgot that the I. O. F. should not by a hair's breadth be compromised in the eye of the public. We deem it right that these officials should be suspended until they can entirely clear both themselves and the order from the shadow their alleged conduct has brought upon it. This court is of opinion that in future no man who has been or is notable as a leader in party politics should be given a prominent position on the salaried staff of this order; that immediately a policy of reduction of expenses, including salaries of Supreme officers, should be entered upon and that for these and other ends a meeting of Supreme Court, in which every subordinate court shall be adequately represented, shall be called without delay."
AMONG THE ESQUIMAUX.—An illustrated lecture will be given in Trinity Church on Monday evening, Nov 5th, at 7.30. Bishop Stringer will give an account of his life and experience amongst the Esquimaux and Indians of the frozen Arctic regions. A land of three months day and three months night, where the people live in snow houses, dress in the skins of wild animals and live on their flesh. The scenes showing the people, their habits and customs, will be thrown on canvass and as each scene is shown, His Lordship in his clear and vivid manner, will describe them. Bishop Stringer, like St Paul, was "in perils often, in perils of the sea, in perils in the wilderness, in perils of the natives" and will present to us an opportunity of learning of the life in that extreme north, which perhaps will never be offered to us again. During the evening a collection will be taken up in aid of missions.

SPECIAL SERVICE.—The Rt. Rev I. C. Stringer, D. D., Lord Bishop of Selkirk, will (D. V.) conduct the services in Trinity Church on Sunday, Nov 4th. His Lordship suffered all the privations and hardships of missionary life for eleven years among the Esquimaux in the extreme north of America. As a result of his zeal and untiring efforts for God and his fellowmen, he was appointed to the high and holy office of Bishop of the Diocese of Selkirk in 1905.
FREE TRIP WEST.—At the Anniversary service in the Presbyterian Church on Sabbath next the Rev W R McIntosh of B. D. Elora will preach morning and evening. On Monday evening at 8 p. m., he will give an instructive address, illuminated with flashes of kindly humor on a "A Trip West, what struck me." The program provided for the occasion announces appropriate musical selections for both diets of public worship on Sunday and a choir service of sacred song for the evening of Monday. The offering presented at the services on both Sabbath and Monday will be devoted to the manse fund. All are cordially invited.
KNOX CHURCH NORMANBY.—The Annual S. S. Entertainment was held Tuesday evening in fine weather, the ample shed room filled to overflowing, the church itself crowded to the door, a splendid program, abundance of rich and wholesome provisions and a fine spirit of Christian good fellowship. Rev Mr Little and Dr Brown of Holstein were present, the latter contributing musically to the delight of the audience, while Mr Little reproduced with admirable clearness and impressiveness the salient features of the great Baltimore conference. Mr Little is moderator during the Knox-amos vacancy, and his presence and assistance were greatly valued. Mr and Mrs Jas Watson as of old took a prominent part in the program, the honors of grandparenthood which they assumed a few days before making no difference in their public spirit. Miss Adair the popular teacher, appears to advantage on the musical platform and fine new voices were Mr Hill, lately from England and Miss Lizzie Pettigrew the latter having an especially pleasing voice. Other solos by Miss Mary Backus and Miss Fee received warm applause. A girls Glee Club, a group of little boys and girls furnished good variety in group singing, while recitations, some of them of a high order were given by Misses Jean Morice, Mary McAllister, Gladys Thompson, Nell Marshall, Henrietta Keller and her sister and E. B. Morice. In addition to all this the choir in full voice sang three anthems. Mr C. Ramage occupied the chair and the proceeds were \$225.50, a fair amount in a small admission. Supt. Thos Gadd informs us the attendance in Sunday School and Bible class is almost 100; a splendid record. On Monday next the united congregations meet to make a choice of a minister.

Directors Meet.
 Last week the Directors of the N. P. C. Co., with the exception of Mr Ratz, met in Durham and had several sessions in and around the busy plant. More, they formed a party and drove to Hanover to investigate the marl property lately secured by Dr Jamieson, the possession of which is evidently desired by the Board, if a fair price can secure it.
 This quest for more marl is not saying Wilder's lake is giving out for one of the Directors assures us it will last for ten years yet, but the possession of new marl deposits is a guarantee of permanence long into the future, something shareholders will value. At the same time, in this searching period, shareholders will look to Directors to direct and will expect that wisdom and caution be exercised before making any purchase, if indeed such a thing is necessary before the Annual Meeting. The purchase of Tobermory lake was expected to strengthen this guarantee of permanence yet opinions as to its value are still wide as the poles, showing that a convincing and exhaustive investigation had not been made.
 Our great plant has a great record; never once has a barrel been returned for imperfection. The present management have also made a record; they have cleared off a debt, given a 5 per cent dividend, undertaken some needed new structures, and promise another dividend at the close of the season. We hope no untoward action or circumstances will mar this splendid record.
A Fair Deal To All
 From the Hanover Post
 The Grand Trunk has made application to put a third line switch across the county line road. The switch was to run south east on to the Dickson property, connecting with the main line at the bridge crossing the dam. Upon this switch a large freight shed was to be erected and a spur run to the Hanover Portland Cement Works. The town council has refused to grant permission, with the result that the matter will probably come before the Railway Commission at Ottawa. The G. T. R.'s request raises some very fine points and the council is doubtless wise in being "canny" and looking before they leap. To those who have studied the local railroad situation it looks as though the combined tracks of the two rival companies, the G. T. R. and the C. P. R. Railways in such close proximity crossing the county line road will be a menace to human life and property and a constant source of worry and trouble. The Grand Trunk of course has rights which must be respected, the Canadian Pacific which is coming through here without a bonus and promises to greatly facilitate shipping interests and indeed travelling generally, assuredly has. But the town also has interests.
 Whatever concessions the G. T. R. receive, and whatever concessions the C. P. R. receive must not be realized at the expense, at the paramount expense, of the town. Perhaps there is no cause for alarm. Perhaps there is. But this matter should be settled fairly to all three concerned with the minimum of danger and the maximum of interest.

1859—1906.
