ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta; excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be home-steaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age to the extent of one quarter section of 160 acres more Entry must be made personally at the local and office for the district in which the land is

The thomesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of 1 At least six months' residence upon an mitivation of the land in each year for three 2 If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or 3 If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicin-ity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. that has got
