to the marketable condition; fresh and dried. The fresh contain a large percentage of water. As an example we have the lettuce asparagus, etc.
The dried vegetables such as beans and peas have lost a considerable amount of moisture that was formerly in them. As a second classification there are those according to composition; the starchy and non starchy. Of the first there is the potato, containing large amount of water and starch and all green vegetables are classed under the second. These have an abu ndance of water and mine.al matter. Again, vegetables are classified according to parts used fo food: Seed s-beans and peas, roots -carrots and parsnips, bulb-onion, tuber-potate) and artichoke, shoots -asparagus, stocks-celery, leaves -lettuce and spinach, flower-cauliflower, fruit--tomato and cucumber, fringe-mush room.
