WANT A MINIMUM, TOO.—West Grey Teachers at their recent Convention took action to have the Government make a minimum salary law for town as well as for country schools. After expressing appreciation of their efforts and claiming that existing evils cannot be remedied by the legislation of last session their memorial reads: "That the legislation should be extended to include urban as well as rural schools, with minimum salaries adapted to various classes of schools and to the positions of Principals, Head-masters and Assistants respectively; and further that inducements by way of grading and special grants should be made to secure liberal salaries, above the minimum; That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Minister of Education, to the Ontario Educational Association, to the various local teachers' associations of the Province, and to the leading daily papers."

SPECIAL SERVICE.—The Rt. Rev. I. C. Stringer, D. D., Loving Bishop of Selkirk, will (D. V.) conduct the services in Trinity Church on Sunday, Nov. 11th. His Lordship suffered all the privations and hardships of missionary life for eleven years among the Esquimaux in the extreme north of America. As a result of his zeal and untiring efforts for God and his fellowmen, he was appointed to the high and holy office of Bishop of the Diocese of Selkirk in 1905.

The Sun says that Dr. Arnold, a well-known Londoner, spent a few days in Owen Sound recently in quest of information in regard to local opinion. To find out the effect of the by-law on local business conditions he called on forty-nine of the leading business men of the town, taking them to the effect of local opinion on their business. Eight thought it had a prejudicial effect; ten had not noticed any difference, and thirty-one declared that their business had been materially increased.

Tomlin, the Liberal candidate, was elected in North Bruce on Tuesday by 348 majority. First Liberal since 1882.

POSTPONED.—The visit of Bishop Stringer to Trinity Church, announced for Sunday and Monday, Nov. 4 and 5 has been postponed one week. He will conduct the services on the 11th inst. and on Monday, the 12th will give his famous illustrated lecture "Among the Esquimaux."

FOUND DEAD.—A despatch to the Globe of Friday last tells of the finding of the body of Mr. Duncan McPhee, Normanby, about half a mile from Aytan Station. He had been missing two weeks and the body was badly decomposed. An inquest was to be held.

GOSPEL TEMPERANCE.—At the 8:15 p. m. Sunday evening Gospel Temperance meeting in the Methodist church the speakers were Rev. Mr. MacIntosh of Elora and Rev. Mr. Newton. Both spoke forcibly, the former along lines of the self-sacrifice necessary, even of friendships and the necessity of leadership to attract the slackness of the churches. He would use all means so far provided but would like above all things the separation of the bar and hotel-keeping. The bar standing on its own footing he was convinced would become a bell-hole so patent to the community, that in a few months there would be irresistible. The next regular business meeting of the Association falls on next Tuesday evening.

AMONG THE ESQUIMAUX.—An illustrated lecture will be given in Trinity Church on Monday evening, Nov. 12, at 7:30. Bishop Stringer will give an account of his life and experience amongst the Esquimaux and Indians of the frozen Arctic regions. A laud of three months day and three months night, where the people live in snow houses, dress in the skins of wild animals and live on their flesh. The scenes showing the people, their habits and customs, will be thrown on canvas and as each scene is shown, his Lordship in his clear and vivid manner, will describe them. Bishop Stringer, like St. Paul, was "in perils often, in perils of the sea, in perils of the wilderness, in perils of the city" and will present to us an opportunity of learning of the life in that extreme north, which perhaps will never be offered to us again. During the evening a collection will be taken up in aid of missions.

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Anniversary Services.

Sunday and Monday last were the Anniversary days of Durham Presbyterian Church and notwithstanding poor weather there were good congregations at the services and at the entertainment on Monday evening. The visiting preacher Rev. Mr. McIntosh, of Elora, won golden opinions from everyone for pulpit ability and on Monday evening showed that he was a lecturer of no mean standing.

In the morning on Sunday he spoke of the importance of grasping the hidden things of faith as well as the material things of our spiritual life, and in the evening preached a powerful and practical sermon on "Inasmuch as ye did it not." The condemnation of our Saviour came not because of lack of faith, nor of erring faith, nor of wrong standards, but simply on account of neglect of duty in the simple ministrations of human life: "Inasmuch as ye did it not."

MONDAY EVENING.
The church was well filled with an interested audience, and before the lecture there was a musical preface of much excellence.

The choir at all the services had special music rendered with a vim rarely equalled even by themselves. Mr. Ridley and Miss Crawford on Sunday gave solos and on Monday evening the soloists were Miss Jean Brown and Mr. Drysdale, the latter also with Miss Margaret Hunter in a duet as did Miss Ida Wilson and Miss Howard.

It was a program worthy of the occasion and the performers deserved the hearty vote of thanks they got. Rev. Mr. Fairbairn was in the chair and made pleasing references in line with the anniversary idea. He recalled the time 47 years before when a young man, Wm. Park was ordained and inducted first minister of Durham Presbyterian church. Of all who met that day possibly only Mr. W. A. Nichol was left, but the foundations they had laid had been built upon by others and the structure still stood. He passed in review the other pulpits incumbents, Mr. Forest, Mr. McNair, Mr. Jansen, all gone but Mr. McNair teaching the lesson of life's brevity.

An anniversary he said had other objects, to get acquainted with outside ministers, and he recalled the names of Ballantyne, Dickey, Duncan, Geggie, Henry, Ross, Wilson, and now McIntosh, and another object of anniversaries was to get something out of them and he introduced the lecturer of the evening. Mr. McIntosh who is a fluent speaker eloquent sometimes, with a fine sprinkling of dry humor mixed with his deeper thoughts, flattered the town to which it was his first visit, and was glad to be with them when remembering the heroes who had gone. Thought the congregation must have been experiencing "blue Monday," or they would have applauded the splendid music they had listened to. He had been giving his lecture "A Trip West, what struck me" for about four years and he was sure they must have noticed what a great emigration had taken place since!

Beginning at Elora he took his audience over the slow G. T. R. to Owen Sound past the inquisitive Bruce peninsula, saw the Sault at the height of its grandeur and arrived at the twin towers of Port Arthur and Fort William, where he found beginning the mind stretching which all feel going west. The big distances, where conductors change, where even the train gets tired, and everything leaves you but the colored porter.

The mighty elevators, like the grapes of Eschol spoke of the fertile plains beyond. He sketched Winnipeg briefly in its growth from old Fort Garry, found Bryant's description of the prairies out of place and

was surprised to find a 400 mile desert. Graphically he took his audience to the mountains sketched their majesty and grandeur, found sterling gems among the rough miners, though the trip showed plainly what a vast need there was for the churches to wake up. It was an inspiring lecture and every one must have felt warm to think they are citizens of so splendid a country. He was accorded a hearty vote of thanks.
