Advisory Council

Wednesday of this week concludes the time for the voting by public school teachers for four representatives to the Advisory Council. Perhaps not half of the 5000 teachers in Ontario will poll their vote. Up to Saturday last only 1750 had done so, 120 of the 300 Separate School teachers had voted, while every Inspector on that date had attended to the duty.

The new method may be democratic enough to suit everyone, but we don't see why the representative character of the Public School Section of the O. E. A. is ignored. Every teacher through the County Conventions is represented by the delegate sent down and that delegated body seems to us to be well-fitted to appoint the four members of the Advisory Council allowed to the Public School teachers of the province. The isolated teacher voting will think chiefly of some one in his or her own neighborhood, with the likelihood that the vote will be frittered away over a great many candidates whose capabilities and record cannot be well known. Better to let the public spirited teachers who are sent or who go of their own initiative to the annual teachers' parliament, make the selection.

—A Vancouver Alderman tried seriously to get two car loads of Hindus shipped to Ottawa, at the city's expense to let the capitalists see the latest invasion they are troubled with.

—The Dominion Parliament is to meet on 22 November. Legislation is looked for to perfect the Election law in the direction of making voting compulsory as a means of lessening the temptation to bribe.

In Memoriam.

Mrs Donald McFayden.

A great light has gone from the home of Mr Donald McFayden, of the 2nd Con., Glenelg, by the death of his wife on Saturday last. Two weeks before she came home from a trip to relatives in Owen Sound and not feeling well. No great alarm however was felt for a week, but serious symptoms developing two physicians were called in who, aided by the loving ministrations of the home, strove to stay the hand of the destroyer, but without avail for she passed away as above. The cause was an acute attack of diabetes.

Deceased was a Miss McGregor whose family lived for a time in the "Glen," Glenelg, but later moved to Bruce County, where a sister, Mrs John Ross, still lives. A brother Donald, in Winnipeg, is the only other survivor of her family.

She was married to Mr McFayden 34 years ago in Walkerton, the officiating clergyman being Rev Dr Moffat, the well-known agent of the Bible Society. This union was blessed with two sons, William and John and two daughters Misses Mary and Katie all well-known and respected here, and these with the sorrowing husband, and uncle Colin C. who lives with them, will sincerely mourn the loss of the loved one who meant so much to all.

Mrs McFayden was a woman of admirable character. Deeply devoted to husband and children, her memory will be cherished by them as a precious possession. All who knew her were attracted by her genial personality and abounding hospitality. Her sudden removal in the midst of a useful life has cast a gloom over the community, and neighbors and friends will join with the deeply bereaved family in lamenting the loss which to her is great gain.

The funeral on Tuesday was a remarkable testimony to the esteem in which deceased was held, it being among the largest, if not the largest ever seen here. Rev Mr Farquharson conducted appropriate services at house and grave and the pall bearers were Wm Weir, W. J. McFarlane, Jno. Moffat, Jos Atkinson, Wm Edge, Hamilton Allen.

Among the relatives from a distance were Mrs Ross, a sister, and her daughter from Bruce Co. and John A. Black from Chesley. Mr Donald Graham, Priceville, Mr and Mrs Cairns, Ceylon, old friends, were also present.

ALEX BINNIE.

"For he knoweth not that which shall be" wrote the wise man in Ecclesiastes, and its truth was strikingly exemplified on Tuesday, when Alex Binnie was called away. He took breakfast as usual and went to his work at the Supply Co, where he has just lately been employed and in less than an hour was stricken with paralysis. He was brought home but medical aid and tender nursing were of no avail for he died at 3.30 p. m. What a lesson for the living! "Man goeth forth unto his labour" but not always "until the evening."

Deceased was the second son in the well-known Binnie family, brothers surviving being George, Glenelg, Jas., minister at Tweed, and Thomas in British Columbia; sisters are Mrs W L Dixon, Mrs Thos McGirr, Mrs D Edge, Mrs Jno Weir, Mrs Jno Bell. About ten months ago he was married to Miss Elizabeth Ector, who, within the year has been doubly bereaved, losing father and husband. Great sympathy will be felt for her so soon to be bereft of a husband's love and care and so suddenly.

Alex Binnie, as all who knew him will say, was an upright man. Most eloquent is the testimony of life long neighbors as to his kindly sym-

pathetic nature, and unbending integrity. In our hearing in presence of his lifeless body, we heard one of them say "there's a man who never did a mean action." For many years he was the companion and mainstay of his mother who predeceased him about two years. Since coming to town he has made many friends and wherever he was employed he was trusted implicitly. He was a devoted member of the Presbyterian Church which will miss his services in Missionary affairs and in other ways. He was in his 56th year, was a worthy member of the A. O. U. W. and his widow will now be benefited by his forethought. He is to be buried on Thursday at 2 p. m.

Rev Jas Binnie will be present and Mrs Jno Moffat, Pinkerton, Mrs Jno Little, Dundalk, sisters of Mrs Binnie. Mrs Peteh, of Edmounton, is another sister, who will mourn alone.

Mrs SCHOFIELD.

Saturday last, in Brockville, the above lady died at the age of 76. She was a sister of the late J H Hunter, M. P., and of the late Mrs Davidson. She grew to womanhood in this town and married Mr Schofield, one of the business men of Durham of those days, but who has been dead many years. Two sons mourn Jas of Fincher Creek, Alta, and Harold, who is in England. There are also three daughters at home and one married in Winnipeg. She will be buried in Brockville on Thursday, the delay being to admit of her son's presence. Mayor Hunter intends to be present. Two sisters of that family remain, Mrs McLaren, of Toronto and Mrs McNab.
