MUNICIPAL ELECTION DATES.—At the recent meeting of the Ontario Municipal Association a resolution was adopted asking the government to fix the last Monday in November as the day for holding municipal nominations and the first Monday in December as election day. This is the system that has been carried out throughout the entire West and the easterners who have gone out west and who know anything of municipal politics would not now think of going back to the old system. The holiday season is not a time for affairs of such importance to be transacted. At that particular time many electors are absent from home and there are many reasons more in touch with things entirely municipal than the earlier dates would be an improvement over those of the present. This is a question that will probably engage the attention of the Ontario legislature at its next session.

DISTRICT EPWORTH LEAGUE.—A very successful meeting of the Epworth League of this District was held Tuesday Oct. 30 in the Methodist church, Holstein, Rev C. P. Holmes, Pres., presiding. All the parts of the district were well represented. Addresses were given by Mr Lattimer, Durham, Mr Gardiner, Mt Forest and Mrs W. Sim, Yeovil. Rev Mr Colling conducted a prayer and praise service for one hour. Others who took part were Rev W. S. Daniels, the new President, Mr Keenleyside, London, Mr Lambert, Mt Forest and Dr Brown. An interesting feature was the presentation to Rev C. P. Holmes and wife, who are going as missionaries to Japan, of a handsome silver tea service by the Holstein circuit. Large congregations, spiritual and strengthening addresses marked the whole services.

AMONG THE ESQUIMAUX.—An illustrated lecture will be given in Trinity Church on Monday evening, Nov. 12, at 7.30. Bishop Stringer will give an account of his life and experience amongst the Esquimaux and Indians of the frozen Arctic regions. A land of three months winter and three months night, where the people live in snow houses, dress in the skins of wild animals and live on their flesh. The scenes showing the people, their habits and customs will be thrown on canvas and as each scene is shown, His Lordship in his clear and vivid manner, will describe them. Bishop Stringer, like St Paul, was "in perils often, in perils of the sea, in perils in the wilderness, in perils of the natives" and will present to us an opportunity of learning of the life in that extreme north, which perhaps will never be offered again. During the evening a collection will be taken up in aid of missions.

—The O. Sound Sun discussing "Too much one-man Control" as seen in recent financial exposures hits the nail on the head as follows: "What is wanted is some scheme that will make directors direct. They are about as useful as the gilt on the sign—they add lustre to the name, that's all. We want directors that will direct."
