The United States Geological Survey announces that the production of Portland cement last year amounted to 35,246,812 barrels, valued at \$33,245,867. This is a gain of 8,749,931 barrels in quantity and \$9,890,748 in value over the output of the year before which amounted to 26,505,881 barrels, valued at \$23,355,119.

BANKS DON'T FAIL IN CHINA.—It is one hundred years since the failure of a bank in China, said a bank examiner. More than nine hundred years ago, in the reign of Hi Hung, a bank failed. Hi Hung had the failure investigated, and to his indignation found it had been due to reckless and shady conduct on the part of the directors and the president. Hi Hung at once issued an edict that the next time a bank failed the heads of its president and directors were to be cut off. This edict, which has never been revoked, has made China's banking institutions the safest in the world.

G. and Chester, and these four chief mourners who, with the deceased formed a happy home, will sadly miss the loving husband and father.

Deceased was a man of more than ordinary intelligence, well read on public affairs, and a genial and hospitable gentleman. After leaving Normanby he farmed for a time near Fergus, then in Artemesia, but latterly in a land agency at London seemed to have struck something for which he was admirably fitted for he was very successful. To Go Through School Grounds

Tuesday last the C. P. R. definitely decided to run their line through the centre of the school property, the nearest fence coming within 30 feet of the building. This is a disagreeable and unhappy proximity but there seems to be engineering difficulties in having it otherwise.

Agent T. A. Harris met the School Board on Tuesday evening and informed them of the decision, and was ready to consider either the purchase of the whole property or of the right of way.

Discussion took place and the Board was unanimous that with the line so near, the usefulness of the school would be destroyed, for two-thirds at least of the available play-ground was taken and the attending noise, dust and danger would be most undesirable.

The Board differed however on the price. Some time ago they unanimously decided to ask \$15000 for the property basing their figure on the report of valuers, Geo. Kress and Hugh MacDonald, who after a careful valuation on conservative lines figured it out \$14,345.00. Mr Harris mentioned \$12000 as his idea, Dr Gun and Mr Saunders moved that the figure be \$13000, Messrs Ramage and McIlraith moved in amendment that the figure be \$14000 and the chairman, Mr Johnston, declared the amendment carried.

Mr Harris could not accept this vote but would the \$13000 and the matter we suppose will now proceed to expropriation on this value.

The position and responsibility of the trustees in this matter has been trying. Since last April they have waited for something definite with building necessities pressing heavily upon them and now that definiteness has come, the Board is doubt divided, each party without doubt thinking they are acting in the town's interest.

A meeting of the rate-payers has been suggested to get at the real desire of the town in this important matter, and to this no one is likely to raise objection.

In any case our beautiful and suitable location is gone forever, with no possibility of duplicating it in this town, cut up as it is with hill and river, and now a railway to consider.

—Dr Coughlin is not to get the position of superintendent of the Institution for the Deaf and Dumb without a protest from those most interested. The President of the Deaf and Dumb Association, of Toronto, in an address, expressed the opinion that the appointment was a purely political one, and one to which Dr Coughlin was not entitled. To put an inexperienced man at the head of such an institution was an insult to the deaf. A deputation is to wait upon the Government at an early date in regard to the matter. We venture to predict that Mr Whitney will turn a deaf ear to the protest.—Ex.

—The courts, probing deeper into the Ontario Bank failure, found a cypher telegram which a former employee refused to sign but which McGill, the manager, signed himself. As it appears to mean the transfer of Ontario Bank funds to McGill's credit in New York it is highly incriminating. The message was directed to the cashier of the Fourth National Bank, New York and read as follows: "Please deacon Cuyler, Morgan and Co. Mullen C. McGill out-way."

which being interpreted reads: "Please charge to our account and pay to Cuyler, Morgan & Co., as coming from C. McGill, \$3000.00.

LAST RITES.—The funeral of the late Alex Binnie took place on Thursday last, and seldom has a larger funeral been seen here. "Sandy," as he was familiarly called, was widely known and highly respected, and scores of his old neighbors from Glen-eig and beyond it, as well as numerous citizens from the town paid the last tributes of respect. Only a small portion of the crowd could get within the reach of the Rev Mr Farquharson's voice, but he made an impressive discourse and pointed out the uprightness that marked all the relations of the deceased with his fellow men and of his interest in spiritual things. The pall bearers were, two old neighbors, Thos Davis and Wm Weir, two townsmen, C. L. Grant and Dr Gun, two fellow workmen Thos Lyons and John McDonald. He sleeps beside his parents, beside the mother, his care and interest in whom was a by-word. Rev Jas Binnie, of Tweed, was present, George and all the Binnie round here, only Thomas of S. C. was absent. This is the first break in a family of nine. Many relatives of the deceased and of his bereaved wife were in the long procession which practically stretched from the town to the cemetery.
