The Esquimaux of St. Michael and the lower Yukon River hold a festival of the dead every year at the beginning of November or the beginning of December, as well as a greater festival at intervals of several years. At these seasons food, drink and clothes are provided for the returning ghosts in the kashim, or clubhouse, of the village, which is illuminated with oil lamps. Every man or woman who wishes to honor a dead friend sets up a lamp on a stand in front of the place which the deceased used to occupy in the club-house. 
