Intended for last week

The two congregations of Amos and Knox church met at the former place on Monday last to choose a minister out of the large number of probationers which have been heard. Upon a standing vote being called for by the moderator (Mr Little) it was found that 43 voted for Mr McRobbie and 42 for Mr Matheson. House of Refuge Notes.

We extract some pathetic references from a budget supplied the Markdale Standard, by Mr F Gee, an inmate and an able writer. After recording the last illness and death of Mrs Smith he adds:

Undertaker Chapman took charge of the remains on Monday afternoon for interment in the Markdale cemetery. As your cor. viewed the remains borne away in an open vehicle, like goods in a box for shipment, not a solitary, sympathizing friend was there to follow, nor, as far as we knew, was anyone present at the grave to perform the last Christian rites of the poor friendless widow as it was lowered into its last resting place, sad was

the sight which brought vividly to his mind the truth of Tom Hood's appropriate lines:

Rattle his bones over the stones,
He's only a pauper that nobody owns.
John Campbell, of Egremont, aged 87, very feeble and totally blind, was admitted to the Home on Thursday last, the 8th inst. The old man was driven from his home, about 28 miles distant. The long drive on that cold, raw, damp day seems to have been too much for him, for on Friday evening he took to his bed, from which it is quite possible and equally probable he may never rise."

County Council.

The second meeting of the November Session of the County Council was held on Tuesday afternoon in the town council chamber the use of which was profited by Mayor Joyce. The members were all present but Mr G A Brown, Warden Thomson in the chair.

Among the communications and accounts presented at the first two meetings, were the following:

Presentment of the Grand Jury from the Fall session; account from the township council of St Vincent for \$9.10 repairs to a bridge on the towline of St Vincent and Sydenham; account from Messrs Woolrich & Leslie for \$18.30 for work at county buildings; an application from John Clark, of Durham, to be appointed Chief County Constable, in the room of George Noble, deceased. A similar application was presented from Hector McDonald, of Priceville; an account from Robert McDowall, County Engineer, for \$65.00, for plans, specifications and work in connection with Heateoths bridge; a draft of a confirmation by-law sent from the township of Artemesia, with a letter from the township clerk, requesting that it be passed; an account from E E Miller, for \$20.00, for services during the illness of Governor Miller, as a result of an accident; an account from John Miller, for \$10.00 for six months' rent of storehouse, from June 30 to December 31; an account from Ryan Bros, for \$57.23 for carpets for Judge Widdifield's room; an account from Richard Bros for \$87.00 for painting or kalsomining the coal kitchen, hall and office; a letter of thanks to the secretary of the Owen Sound General and Marine Hospital, for the grant of \$1000.00 made in June last; a number of statements from the county treasurer, viz: statement of the distribution of grants to the agricultural societies in the county; statement of equivalent to government grants to continuation classes in the public schools in the county; statement of county equivalent to government grants to separate schools in the county, statement of stationery account; list of auctioneers and hawkers and peddlers who have taken out licenses in this county.

These several statements were referred to the respective standing committees to which they related; Mr Sloan presented a special report of commissioners Allan and McArthur, on the erection of a bridge at Cedarville; Wm J Hewitt asked to be appointed chief constable in the place of George Noble, deceased; W J Sheppardson also asked to be appointed chief constable; report of Dr Bruce Smith on the county house of refuge at Markdale; a letter from T R Eargally, field secretary for free consumption hospital asking for a grant of \$300.00 to endow a bed; Mr Preston presented report No 1 of house of refuge committee. On motion council went into committee of the whole on the report Mr Allan in the chair, the report was adopted and engrossed in the minutes.

Moved by Mr Preston, seconded by Mr Ball, that the members of this county council now in session, hereby place on record their sincere regret that their friend and colleague, Mr G A Brown, is again unable through illness, to meet with them at this their last session of their term of office, and perhaps the last time that most of us will meet in capacity of county councillors. We extend to our sick friend our heartfelt sympathy in his long and serious illness. Our prayer is that Divine strength and Grace may be given to sustain him in the restoration of his wonted health and strength. But should it be otherwise, may he be prepared to enter in and enjoy the rest which God has prepared for those who love Him; and that if we never meet on earth again, we may all live so that we parting shall be no more--Cried unanimously by a standing vote; the clerk was instructed to forward a copy of foregoing resolution to Mr Brown.

On motion the council adjourned till 2 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon.
