# SUPPLEMENT TO THE DURHAM REVIEW

DURHAM, 29 NOVEMBER, 1906.

### Opening of Parliament.

Last Thursday, the House of Commons met in the third session of the tenth parliament. This is much earlier than usual. The chief object being to have the tariff discussed and readjusted in winter and also to get through in good time to allow of the Premier and others attending the Colonial conference in London next spring.

Among the very first announcements was the resignation of Hon. C. S. Hymen, minister of Public Works, who has been ordered south by his physician on account of his health. There can be little doubt it would have come anyway owing to the scandals unearthed in the constituency. Hon. Mr. Fielding, fresh from a complimentary banquet, and his recent great victory had a rousing reception, as had in a less degree the other new members.

The speech from the throne was of the usual kind: congratulations on the good harvest and prosperity, the increasing number of immigrants and the improved quality, the gratification of His Excellency at the development of the West as seen on his recent visit, pointed out that the quinquennial census of the west gave the new provinces more representation, promised revision of the tariff, wanted sanction of parliament to a new treaty with Japan, the Canadian exhibit at Milan had been a great success, had accepted the Halifax dockyard, steps being taken to prevent immigration frauds. It also referred to great expansion of revenues during the year, the recent colonial conference, and some important legislation coming amendment to the election act, the Post Office act, Dominion Land act, etc.

The opposition are showing great activity and will no doubt "rub it in" to the government on the London election trial and other matters which the government and their supporters will have trouble less or more in explaining.

The great battle will be on the tariff, and the struggle really simmers down to the interests of the manufacturing or the farming community. The former want increases the latter want decreases or at least as little change as possible of existing rates. The present rates seem to inflate the revenue, manufacturers are generally prosperous and the same may be said of the other class, and the great body of consumers certainly want no increase.

While the revenue is expanding some simple people think the debt might be reducing and nothing would be more popular, perhaps nothing more wise, than to have a few millions lopped off.

### Bentick Council.

Artemesia Council met in the town hall Flesherston on Saturday Nov 3, 1906, members all present, the Reeve in the chair. Minutes of previous session were read and confirmed. Communications as follows were presented and read: Clerk of the Peace, certificate of filing jurors' lists; R McDowell, Engineer, re Johnston ditch; Dr Sproule, re ditch on town line Artemesia and Glenelg at Lot 105. Bylaw No 675, to appoint deputy returning officers, poll clerks and places for holding elections, 1907, was introduced and passed after being filled up as follows: Div 1, D R O W McLoughry, poll clerk H Irwin, polling place Orange Valley, Div 2, D R O Thomas Clayton, poll clerk Ed Thompson, polling place town hall, Div 3, D R O Geo moore, poll clerk W H Heard, polling place Orange Hall, Div 4, D R O A Gielchrist, poll clerk J P Collinson, polling place Orange Hall, Ceylon, Div 5, D R O D G McLean; poll clerk A B McDonaid, polling place Watson's hall, Pricerville. Div 6, D R O Geo Pritchard, poll clerk S Gilbert, polling place Forcesters' hall, Vandeleur. Div 7, D R O George Meldrum, poll clerk Wm Walker, polling place Orange Hall, Eugenia. Div 8, D R O H Thompson, poll clerk Jos E McKee, polling place school house, Portlaw. Price to be allowed for halls for polling, \$2.50, and no pay allowed for constable.

Best—Whyte—That John Bellamy be paid his account for repairing hall furnace and pipes furnished, \$12.50.—Car.

Whyte—McLoughry—That the Reeve clerk and assessor be paid \$8 each as selectors of jurors.—Carried.

McKenzie—Whyte—That the report of commissioner of Div No 3, Mr Best be received and he be paid his commission on an expenditure of \$258 of appropriation, amounting to \$25.50, and also \$5.10 commission on special expenditure of \$51.—Carried.

Best—Whyte—That the treasurer and clerk be paid \$8 each, expenses to Owen Sound attending on provincial auditors.—Carried.

McKenzie—Best—That accounts for gravel used by overseers be paid, viz., S Pedlar \$4.10, W Badgerow \$1.20, John Pedlar \$1.55.—Carried.

McLoughry—McKenzie—That Dr Sproule be paid \$22.50, being one half of his account for ditching on town line Artemesia and Glenelg at lot 105, T and S Road.—Carried.

McKenzie—Best—That the Reeve be paid \$4.50 for his services in connection with the Collinson and Johnston ditches under the Ditches and Watercourses Act.—Carried.

McKenzie—McLoughry—That the Reeve issue checks to the several school boards for the amounts of general school trustees' levy for 1906.—Carried.
