County Council

The County Council met on Wednes- day afternoon at 7 1/2 o'clock... from Tuesday, the 27th inst.

The following documents among others were presented and read by the clerk: Annual from Jan H. Thomson for bridge inspection, etc., \$11.42; account from John Pringle for \$6.00 for bridge inspection and millage account from John Harrison & Sons Co for \$14.50 as clerk for the County Clerk of the Peace's office; account from the Owen Sound Advertiser for advertising the November election, \$2; account from John Miller for \$9 for bills for Court House grounds; account from James Kenney \$23.25 for work, including, etc., at County building; account from John A. Blaharison for \$14.25 for printing for the Clerk of the Peace; account from W. H. Wright for \$28.25 for painting town'sy's dwelling; account from the County Clerk for \$10.55 for refund of postage paid during June session; three accounts from the Owen Sound Times for \$16.25 for advertising for sundry for bridge and the Nov session; a letter from School Inspector Burgess accompanied by a copy of the Arbitrator's Award, re Freeton school sections.

Mr J. W. Frost presented report No. 1 of Finance committee. Mr Shute presented report No 1 of Road and Bridge committee. Mr Bell presented report No 1 of Education committee. Mr Allan presented Report Nos 1 & 2 of Judicial Audit.

Mr McArthur presented a special report on the Pricessville bridge. The first four named reports above were adopted and the warden referred the last one to the Road and Bridge committee. The session adjourned until Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

County Council met on Thursday afternoon and after routine business and presentation of accounts. Mr Harness, manager of the House of Refuge addressed the council in reference to that institution. Mr Shute presented report No 2 of road and bridge committee.

Mr Paterson presented report No 1 of county property committee. Mr McCanell presented report No 1 of printing committee. These reports were adopted, that of the road and bridge committee being first amended in the committee of the whole.

Moved by Mr McArthur, seconded by Mr Bell that leave be granted the mover to introduce a by-law to confirm by-law No 166 of the township of Ardenensis, to close up and dispose of certain original allowances for road in said township.—Carried unanimously.

By-law introduced, read a first time and numbered 207. It was then read the second time and on motion, council adjourned till 2 o'clock on Friday afternoon.

On Friday afternoon the clerk read to the council two letters received by the warden from County Councillor Brown expressing his thanks for the kindly worded resolution of sympathy which had been forwarded to him by the council. The clerk was instructed to acknowledge the receipt of the letters.

Mr John W Frost presented report No 2 of finance committee. Mr Paterson presented report No 3 of House of Refuge committee. On motion, council went into committee of the whole on report No 2 of finance committee. Mr McArthur in the chair. The reports were adopted. Mr N W Campbell public school inspector of South Grey, was present, and addressed the council in reference to an error in connection with Dundalk continuation classes.

Moved by Mr J W Frost, seconded by Mr Freston that leave be granted to introduce a by-law to appoint a high constable for the county of Grey.—Carried unanimously.

By-law introduced, read a first time and numbered 208. The by-law was read a second time.
