Obituary

On Sunday, 25 November there passed away one of the very earliest pioneers of this district in the person of Mrs Matthew Barber, Sr at the ripe age of 88 years. She was only about 10 days ill, but for a year or two back age brought its infirmities and death to the tired spirit came as a relief, though to the survivors the separation of this link between the present and the past has its measure of sorrow. She survived her husband about 11 years.

Deceased was a native of Glasgow, Scotland, and came to this country in 1812. She was one of the first to be in Durham along with the Hunter and was thus the oldest pioneer at the time of her death. After her marriage to the late well-known Matthew Barber they lived for a time about a mile north of Durham moving later to the lot now occupied by their son Matthew and at last to the well known corner which bears their name still, and now owned by their eldest son Richard. Only to very few is granted a record of 64 years continuous residence in one district. Besides the two sons named there are three daughters surviving: Isabella Mrs Henstridge, of Stoney Creek, Carrie, Mrs Grant and Janet, Mrs Nowry, both of Detroit. Mr and Mrs Henstridge and Mrs Grant were home for the funeral on Wednesday last at which old friends and neighbors assembled. She was buried in Maple wood cemetery across the road where she has seen hundreds of funeral assemblages in her time.
