

Recalls Roderick Cochrane Early Durham.

Mr Robt Cochrane kindly handed us the following reminiscent letter from his brother. It was not meant for publication, but it is just the kind of letter that should be preserved. It will make interesting reading to his friends and to all who yalue historical allusions to the origin of the place. Mr R. Cochrane informs us that the Bob Turner alluded to used to long to see the world. Ho enlisted in Toronto, was drafted to Gibraltar and died there.

Worcester, Mass., Noy. 22nd '06 My Dear Bob.

I was disappointed in opening your letter vesterday to find the "Durham Chronicle Special" instead of one of your breezy letters. Let me say right here I did not recieve any letter at St. John, N. B. and I wish you to repeat it and send to me here for I want to hear from you.

Next to a letter you could not have sent me anything that has given me more pleasure than the Trace Edition of Durham. First, let me say it is a credit to the publisher in its matter, arrangement, cuts and typography, and should do your town a lot of good. Durham has grown much since I last saw it. I had forgotten that you had anything in the manufactures but the Cement and that is much larger than I supposed. I am glad to see that the Cochranes are still represented in the municipal and business interests. Miss Cochrane in the implement line. Mr. Morlock in the mercantile and yourself, God bless you, in the municipal. Durham without the Cochranes would not be Durham. Last night when I finished reading
