**Priceville**  
 Concluded from last Week

But we mustn't stop here too long so we pass on to Martin Stonehouse and family who owns 200 acre of land on both sides of the road and doing well. Mr and Mrs Stonehouse are getting on the decline. Both of them were school children in the old schoolhouse referred to above, when one evening they took it into their heads to get married the next day instead of going to school, 45 years ago. We hope they will enjoy life long yet.

On the south side of the road we come next to the residence of Professor Konold, who is wide and favorably known as music teacher. Mr and Mrs Konold are quite smart yet. The place is occupied also by the son Otto and family who runs the whole farm of 250 acres, noted for keeping a large number of good horses and cats. Otto didn't thrash yet, was to have a blower last week but the blower was blown up some way or another and didn't come yet. We step backwards a little to the residence of Malcolm McInnes, who owns 125 acres part on both sides of the road. Malcolm rented his farm and he is now going to devote his time to driving an is to become a resident of Priceville soon.

Along side is Colin McLean on the farm lately bought from Donald McDonald. Colin is a well to do young man and judging from the straightness of his ploughing some 60 rods of a furrow, the passerby will admit at once that Colin is a good farmer.

Next we come to Wm Smellie's, this farm was originally the McCannells of Boothville but went under the name of McDonald's while here, (thinking it to be a better name of course). This was the residence of the well-known McLachlan family, North line for a number of years. Mr Smellie bought this place from the late Rev John McMillan over 30 years ago. On this farm was erected a big church, put up by all denominations docting some in drawing logs, hewing, etc. Latterly it became the property of the then Free Church. Some time in the early sixties the late Rev Chas Cameron held service for a number of years, until it was abandoned by having a new one built in Priceville. Mr Smellie, like a great many of his kind, lost his life partner many years ago. On the opposite side is the old McArthur place, being the home of our worthy commissioner, J McArthur, Esq., in his boyhood days. On this place he was raised till he came to manhood and from one step to another he was promoted to positions of honor since. John McArthur is next, has a fine brick house and frappe barn. Mr and Mrs McArthur are good citizens, always obliging in their manner.

Along side is McArthur boys, who own a farm on both sides of the old Durham Road. John was foreman on the Right of way gang on the new Railroad this fall. Down the hill again is Dan McArthur Sr, on the old Livingstone place put up a frame barn a few years ago and doing fairly well on the farm.

Now we are at the old Bunesan farm being Dan McInnes' place, this was originally where the Bunesan P O found shelter in its infancy. Mr McInnes is a progressive farmer. At the turn up the hill was the Presbyterian church which served its time and was sold to Mr McInnes a few years ago and converted into a driving house.

Down the sideroad is the old McKinnon place, now owned by Donald McKinnon, Jr, the old people are no more. This was once one of the best wheat growing farms on the Durham Road. On the other side is Donald McCormick. One of the finest spring creeks in the County runs across these farms and of course the quality of land where it runs through is not as fine as it is elsewhere.

On the opposite side is Professor Stewart. When a highlander hears the pipes played by Mr Stewart it make him feel young again if he is getting old.

Now we are at Bunesan, found the obliging postmaster at his post but in looking at the post office, we find there is a mistake somewhere, for Bunesan was the name of a small village in the Isle of Mull, Scotland, taken from the gaelic word "Ban an Eassan" or at the corner side of a boiling fountain. Now our P O is on the upper side and the good postmaster came not from the Isle of Mull, Scotland, but for all we know from Londonderry in Ireland, but no matter he is the right man in the right place and fills his seat to perfection.
