

RESULT OF THE ROBURITE DISAS TER IN GERMANY.

Hundreds Injured-Ninety-six Are in Dangerous Condition-Several Hundred Are Only Slightly Hurt-Emperor William Aids

Dortmund, Germany, Dec. 3 .- So far as can be ascertained this morning 24 persons were killed, 96 were dangerously wounded and several hundreds were slightly injured as a result of the explosion last night of the roburite factory near Annea.

At the time of the explosion 800 bexes, each containing 80 pounds of roburite, were stored in the factory. The great force of the explosion was felt as far as Dortmund, ten miles from the scene of the disaster, where a large number of windows were broken.
