

MURDERER OF RICE DECIDES TO APPEAL TO GOVERNOR.

Heeds Plea of His Family-Wife and Brother-in-law at Last Prevail on Him to Break Oath Not to Yield.

New York, Dec. 10.—Albert T. Patrick, under sentence of death for the murder of William M. Rice, has made application to Governor Higgins for a pardon. The prayer is formal and means that the lawyer who for five years has been making on extraordinary fight for his life has decided to heed the advice of his family and friends, and will accept a commutation of his sentence to life imprisonment. Patrick himself drew up the application in the "death house" of Sing Sing.
