## WHO OWNS BED?

INTERESTING CASE DECIDED AT CHATHAM BY JUSTICE CLUTE.

Declared That as the Thames River is Non-Navigable Stream, Owners of Land on Bank Have Rights as Far as Centre of Stream.

Chatham Despatch-An interesting case was concluded before Mr. Justice Clute here at noon to-day, when judgment was given in vs. Pickard & Aubrey. The case arose over of the River Thames near Kentbridge. The defendants had removed gravel therefrom for disbandment of someof the battalions of cement works, and the plaintiff brought the British army in the furtherance of the river on his side, while the defendants claimed the ownership rested with the

Mr. Justice Clute held that the plaintiff's title to the adjoining lands carried to the edge of the water, that the river was a nonnavigable stream, and that therefore the plaintiff owned as far as the centre o the stream.
