Governor Van Zant Faces Accusations Before Commission.

Evidence Heard Regarding Immoral Conduct at Institution.

Toronto despatch: That the discipline of Governor Van Zant at the Toronto Jail was poor and that favoritism had been shown some of the guards was the effect of a portion of the testimony in the investigation before Commissioner Judd of London in the Court House yesterday regarding charges against the Governor.

John Brown, the engineer at the jail was the first witness called. He had been appointed in November, 1890, by the City Council. He frequently came into contact with the prisoners, since they often helped him in his work. H had never been warned not to talk
