## The Nominations.

**Some Elected and Some Contesting.**

**DURHAM**

The Town Hall Council, was filled to overflowing Monday evening by many interested ratepayers met to hear civic affairs discussed by retiring and aspiring servants.

Clerk Vollett received the nominations and was continued in the chair for the after speaking.

Contrary to custom, but eminently proper, school affairs were given priority, and Trustee Saunders, the only one present at the time, was called on and said a few words. Secy Ramage entered as the Mayor's ward and to be called on and from the platform gave information as to school Receipts and Expenditure, Railway and other matters. Some of the facts may be recorded here:

Nine teachers are employed, ten during Model Term. Three of these spend their whole time in Continuation Class work and receive \$1800 a year, the Model Assistant got \$200. Six teachers attend to Public School work and the salaries of these with caretaker of two buildings, amounts to nearly \$2500. Fuel, the next big item costs from \$250.00 to \$300.00, and rent of extra room, supplies, equipment, improvements, &c. &c. run away with a lot more.

Besides the draft from the town, the Continuation classes receive from the government \$300 and from the County \$450. Fees of pupils amount to nearly \$700. The Public School amount amounts to a little over \$200. Owing to the largely increased fees from the Model School, extra county grant, etc., there was a balance on hand of \$580.

Reference was made to the necessity of new closets, more accommodation, present heating and ventilating system which is not giving full satisfaction and other matters pertinent questions being in the absence of documents. Chairman Johnson and the other trustees being absent the clerk called on the nominees for Mayor.

Mr. Calder regretted the absence of Mayor Hunter and would have liked the council of 1906 to have reported on their stewardship before speaking.

From the statement of recent years he showed how a deficiency between intake and outlay increased from \$1237 in 1905 to \$2129 in 1906 and to \$3045 in 1907. This surely calls for serious treatment. More pleasing was his showing of the debenture debt of the town, for when loans were returned, there would be net liabilities of only about \$17000. He referred to the fine list of councillors nominated, most opportunist because the coming year was the most important in the town's history. At the request of influential ratepayers he had entered the field against Mr Hunter, both had canvassed, and when he was left in the field and opposed by Mr. Moran, he felt no one could reasonably ask him to retire.—Mr. Moran was opposing him, not Mr. Moran.

He dealt with coming questions of great importance, the CPR level crossing, new bridge, improved street coverings. Besides no great effort had been made of recent years to secure new industries: the present boom and advantageous time called for a pull together to let our advantages be known. He took up the factory and showed by his course on the Board during 1906 in insisting on repayment of the disputed claim, that he could not be tied to any company or association in preference to the town. He was proud to be a shareholder in giving them all their rights and generous treatment, but the interests of the town in which he had a large stake, was with him always first.

He refused to run last year because he knew he was likely to be absent. This year he was intending to be free. He had the greatest respect for his neighbor, Mr Moran, but asked them to consider the record of both and their opportunities to do the town service.

Mr. Moran said Mr Calder had given his annual municipal recitation and was endeavoring to talk against time. He had tried to show that his, Mr Moran's, position as a citizen did not entitle him to ask their suffrages; Where, he asked was Mr Calder? Shooting deer in Muskoka or speculating in the North West.

It has been said and he believed with some truth that his stubbornness had driven them into debt. He was the same old two and sixpence yet; when in office before it was a one man council. There should be peace and harmony round the council board, but this would not be possible with Mr Calder as Mayor. He had

no notion of running till Mr Hunter retired, and he yielded to the pressure brought upon him. Had as good a right as Mr Calder to ask their support ("sure thing" ejaculated Mr Calder). He was with them every day of the week, every week of the month, every month of the year. As a councillor he had done his duty fairly, believed he could serve them in a higher office, and asked for their support.

Mr Calder was nominated by S. McCracken and E. P. McClocklin, Mr Moran by Thos. McGirr and Raymond Jackson. Mr Laidlaw was nominated for Reeve by Ben Sharp and Hugh McDonald, Mr Saunders by Geo. McKay and John Mitchell.

Mr Saunders said his time and position was not suited for the reeveship, but he would endeavor to serve the town as he had had, done in the trusteeship and would leave it to the electors.

Mr Laidlaw without imputing wrong to the council, pointed out the need of a strong council for 1907. We have a few of similar towns paying 24 to 28 mills, and having a fair assessment should not consider 22 mills a high rate. The town was becoming well and widely known, and outsiders would invest money here if properly approached by a strong council. Elected or not he would work for the town, he was not unduly anxious to serve either as reeve or councillor, but promised faithful service, as in the past if elected.

Mr Jas Lenuhan had striven to look after their interests, and as chairman of the Fire and Light committee, he was confident the expenditures would commend themselves as judicious. He showed how the C. P. R. had kept delaying them, but how promptly the town had stopped them working within the corporation. He had used economy, did his best, and asked support for similar service.

Mr Whelan couldn't see how any one could run down the present council. Expenditures were small but judicious and he would advise the same again in a similar situation. No men could keep them any longer, he would not grumble at his accept his wife, he had been regular in attendance, and if elected would be found at his post in the interest of the town.

Mr Cochran for the first time took a position on the platform. The present council was composed of honest men, doing the town's business. The only strictly business man on the board was the worst absentee. They might elect what council they liked but they would not do better than this year's council. He showed up lucidly how much of the expenditure was uncontrollable.

Mr. Thos. Swallow was strange to municipal work and it to him, but he wanted to learn. He was going to stand, "if you don't start you'll never get there," and promised he would be no deadhead.

Mr B Sharp promised his best services, if elected, but would not go from house to house. Mr Wolfe with drew. Mr Furneaux, had with his colleagues done the best he knew how and would do so again if elected.

This completed the list of nominees present, and Mr Calder wished to present, and in denial of stubbornness or of bringing on law suits, and said legal expenses appeared in this year's statement four times greater than in the coming year he could give an undivided service, denied the imputation of having a word to express his own views but hampered no one.

Mr Lenuhan pointed out that half of the law costs were from the preceding year. Mr Moran corroborated this and accused Mr Calder of putting money in his own pocket over the mail investigation. "Not one cent indignantly denied Mr Calder, and Mr Moran pointed to the item in the statement opposite Mr Calder's name. Mr Calder effectually demolished this charge by pointing out that the sum paid him was for expenses only, not one cent of wage or fee had he received and he had given his time for nothing.

Some one called "Hurrah for Calder, and the meeting adjourned.
